BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

The Superintendent and Registrar of the Calvary Cemetery submitted explanation as follows of the charges preferred against him at last meeting of the Board

"In answer to your minute I have to reply that it is not true that any one in charge here in my absence prevented an interment by order of the Relieving Officer. The true facts are these: the two men who brought the remains in the Union Hearse asked for the Key of the Mortuary to leave the coffin there, stating that the Union men would, as usual, come the next ~~day~~ morning and enter the remains.

In the course of the next day as no men came from the Union I hired a messenger and sent a note to the Master asking him to send up men as usual. The messenger brought me back a verbal message from Mr. Athy that it was Mr. Coleman's business. When during the afternoon no men came from him I walked into town and after some difficulty found Mr. Coleman, Relieving Officer, who stated to me he had paid the men.

I tried to reason with him of the foolishness of paying for work before had, particularly with the class of men he had hired. He said he would see about it. The next morning two men came from the Union and I myself saw the remains removed from the Mortuary and decently interred. Now I think no reasonable man will deny that under the circumstances I or any other man could do more.

As to the child afterwards interred by Mr. Coleman,

Coleman, I did not get as usual any notice from him of the funeral, and my wife who was in charge asked him was it all right without the Union men, and he said it was. As Mr. Coleman had to pass by the Cemetery on his way to Castlebar, he might easily have left word.

Perse proposed that the explanation furnished by Mr. Darcy be accepted but that Mr. Darcy be cautioned that in future in case he does not get a satisfactory reply from the Master of the Workhouse to an application for the assistance of two inmates of the Workhouse in the interment of paupers, that he at once report the matter to the Clerk of the Union.

that we request the Local Government Board to direct a sworn inquiry to be held into the charges preferred against the Superintendent of the Cemetery that he allowed the remains of a pauper to remain in the Mortuary Chapel without interment from Wednesday till the following Friday, as we consider there has been culpable negligence in this case on the
