The Committee having looked <sup>thru</sup> the Medical Officers evidence and the Dispensary attached, find the house, in an unfinished and unsatisfactory state; the walls weeping, the Chimney smoking, the Dispensary floor, and the plastering of the Closets, useless the eave shoots around the house have not been put up, nor the drainage pipes laid in their place & rain leaks thro the front wall of the house to the looms inside. The entrance gate ordered some months ago has not been supplied and no provision has been made for storing Coal for the use of the Dispensary.

The Committee strongly recommends that the Guardians will take steps to have the house, and Dispensary, made tenable, before being rendered dangerous to health, and ruinous to the Medicines.

Mr Chairman & Gentlemen

We beg to submit for your approval notes on the time during which the head nurse & head maids of the four hospitals should be off duty and permitted to leave the hospital for recreation.

It has been reported by the four hospitals in Calcutta for some information on the subject & the Registrar has kindly sent the enclosed letter with printed notes.

But in consequence of the uncertainty of the admission of the Administration of patients to the General Fever Hospital & the length of time that sometimes pass without any patients being admitted to the wards, we think the following rules will meet the necessity of the case.

There is already on duty a nurse on the fourth floor which makes one nurse short of the amount from the hospital after 9 o'clock P.M. We think this will be a good plan.

1. When there are no patients in the hospital the (Nurses or head maids) might have 2 hours before 9 o'clock & if the wards 2 hours in the afternoon of the day but not so much consecutively.

2. When there are patients in the hospital it would not be conducive to the ease of patients, nor to proper order that the head nurse should be absent for more than one hour before 9 o'clock and one hour in the evening.

The head maids might have an hour if they could have a walk in relation.

He is not to have access to any part of the Workhouse except the tailor's workshop.

On the first division Messrs. Kearns, Lynch, Sullivan and Ashe received respectively 5, 6, 4, and 1 votes.
