10th June '91. From Mr John Martyn, Poor Rate Collector, stating that when appointed in 1886 he undertook to discharge the duties of collector at the rate of 5¹/₂^d in the pound. Now nearly the entire of the Electoral Division of Clareubridge, the largest in his district, has been purchased by the occupying tenants which necessitates a house to house collection instead of receiving the Rates from the landlords. BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

No. 23137/91 } From the local Government Board stating that they
4th June } have had before them the resolution of the Board
of Guardians, the Burial Board, of the 20th ultimo re-
-questing a sworn inquiry in connection with
the recent interment of Mary Francis in the
Galway Cemetery on the ground that the Guardians
consider that there has been culpable negligence in
this case on the part of some of the Union Officials;
and requesting that the Guardians will be good
enough to define the charges and name the of-
ficials individually against whom they are
made in order that each official might in the
event of an inquiry be aware of his position.

The Guardians beg to state in reply that a definite
charge has been made against Mr. John Sibrey
the Superintendent and Registrar of the Galway
Cemetery, that the remains of Mary Francis were
brought to the Cemetery for interment at about 5.30
pm. on the ^{29th} April last, and that he failed to have the
interment carried out till the 2nd May.

Mr. Sibrey in an explanation furnished to the Board
at meeting on the 20th ultimo stated that he sent a note
to Mr. Edward J. Athy, the Master of the Workhouse
asking him to send some of the pauper inmates
as usual to bury the remains of this pauper, and
that he received a verbal reply that it was not his
(Mr. Athy's) duty to attend to this business but that of the Relieving
officer. That he (Mr. Sibrey) then called upon Mr. James
Coleman the Relieving Officer for Galway District with
the view to get him to send men to carry out the
interment, and Mr. Coleman informed him that he
had paid men to do the work, and that he would

see

see about it, that ultimately two men came from the
Workhouse and the remains were removed from the
mortuary chapel and interred.

In this way Mr. Sibrey endeavours to throw the respons-
ibility of the delay of interment over on the Master
of the Workhouse and the Relieving Officer, and it
is for the purpose of ascertaining who is at fault that
the Guardians have called for a sworn inquiry.

In compliance with ~~the~~ request in letter from L. G. B No 26.. 280 I beg to inform You that I was notified by a Serjt of Police on Wednesday the 29th April that a woman named Mary Francis Coy dead in a Cabin in Minlo two miles from Galway and that she was quite destitute with no friends to provide a Coffin. I immediately ordered one, also the Hearse and two men to Coffin and remove the remains to the Galway Cemetery for interment. I also gave a written order to one of the men to be given to Mr D'Arcy the Superintendent to allow the remains to be interred. On arrival at the Cemetery Mr D'Arcy was absent and a woman who was in charge of the Cemetery declined to allow the men to inter the remains but to place the Coffin in the Mortuary Church until Mr D'Arcy come home. I got no information of the remains not being interred until Thursday evening when Mr D'Arcy told me. I immediately went to the Workhouse and asked the Master to allow two men to go up to the Cemetery I saw them and they went up the following morning and buried the remains.

As to the burial of paupers outside the Workhouse I never had orders given me that I was to superintend the burial of such persons.
