That we beg to express the opinion that to be compelled to do so would be a gross injustice to the ratepayers of this Union as the chances are about twenty to one against the prisoner having been a resident within this Union before committal, prisoners being committed to Galway Prison from the entire County Galway, and we believe a wider area. That the Prisons Board should defray the cost of maintenance and medical treatment of the prisoner in the Fever Hospital of the Workhouse.

27th Sept. } Stating that they had their attention drawn to the circumstance that the bonds at present in force for the collectors of poor rates and their sureties were in most cases entered into before the passing of the Seed Potatoes Supply Acts, 1890-91, and that in no case is any direct reference made in the bond to the rates leviable under those Acts. The collection of the seed rate is a new duty cast on the collector and was not contemplated when the existing bond was entered into, and the Board are advised that a new bond should be obtained from the collector and his sureties in every case where a seed rate has been made under the Acts mentioned, or is to be made in any division comprised in the collector's district, as the Guardians would otherwise have no security for the due discharge of the collector's duty in the

collection of such rate. Forwarding a copy of the existing form of bond with some words inserted to make it specifically applicable to the seed rate as well as to the poor rate, and recommending the Guardians to call upon the collectors and their sureties to enter into a new bond in this form accordingly.

28th Sept. } Acknowledging receipt of Minutes of the 16th instant, and in reply to the Guardians' inquiry as to the admission and maintenance of a person discharged from Galway gaol suffering from fever, the Board desire to point out that once the discharge of a prisoner has been

ordered,

ordered, the Governor of the Prison has no power to detain him, and that a person thus discharged who is suffering from a dangerous infectious disease, such as fever, ought to be admitted to the fever hospital of the Workhouse in the Union in which he lies sick. Cases of this kind cannot bear removal to a distance, and the speedy isolation and treatment of such a patient in a fever hospital is rendered necessary for his own sake as well as in the interests of the public health, as presenting the best means for preventing the disease from spreading. The Board believe that the Prison's authorities have no power to provide for the maintenance of a person who has been discharged from custody.

21st Sept. '91. Removal Order of Bidget Duggan and her three children from Glasgow to Galway Workhouse.
