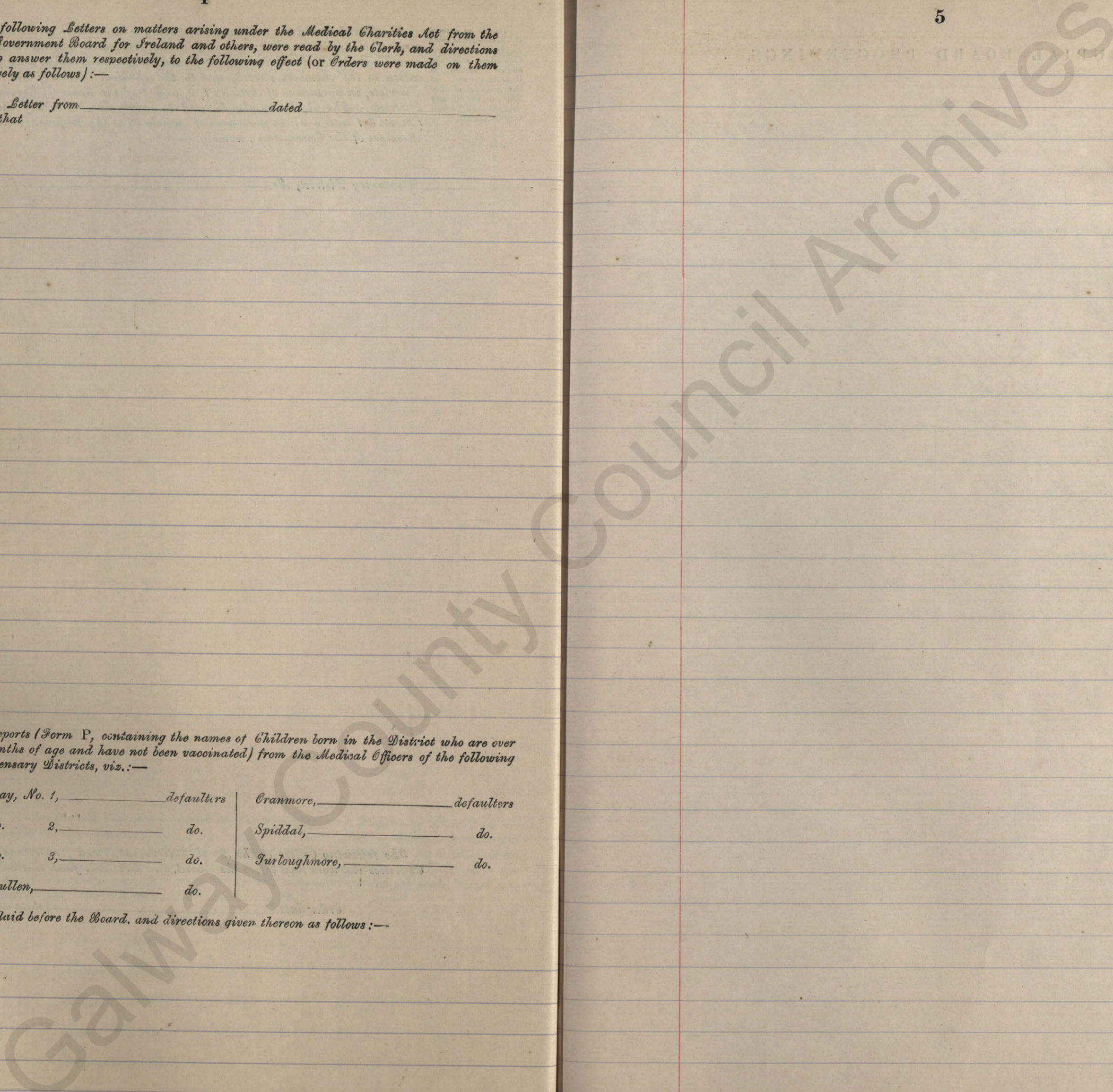

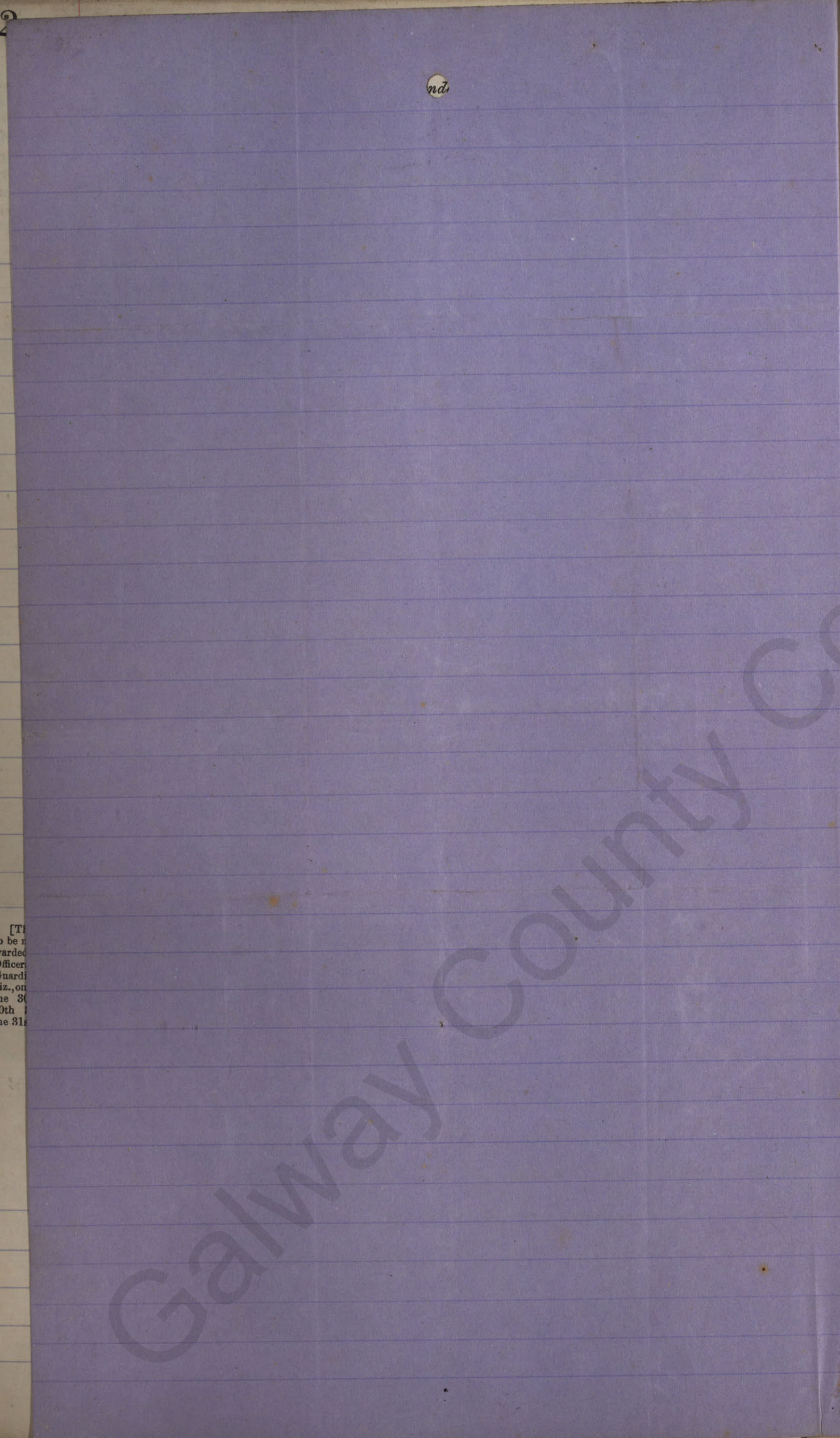

## BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

7<sup>th</sup> Nov: '91. From the Rev. J. F. Berry, Rector of Galway, acknowledging the receipt of invitation to meet the Committee appointed to consider the scale of charges for plots at Rahoon Cemetery, and expressing regret that other engagements prevented him attending on the day appointed. Stating that he understands that there is plenty of room for all in this new Cemetery, and that he feels quite sure it is only necessary to make the Board of Guardians aware that the Protestants expect a portion of the Cemetery to be allocated to them, and they will apportion a part for their use.

The Clerk informed the Board that in compliance with the direction of the Board at last meeting, he summoned the Committee to meet at the Board Room at 12 o'clock on Friday last, to fix a scale of charges for grave spaces in Rahoon new Cemetery. Also that he had invited the Rev. P. J. Lally, P.P., J. F. Berry, Rector, and H. Clarke, Presbyterian Clergyman, to attend. No member of the Committee put in an appearance, and the Rev. H. Clarke was the only clergyman who attended.

Resolved that the Clerk be directed to write to the Rev. J. F. Berry and the Rev. H. Clarke and express the deep regret of the Guardians at the mistake that they had made in directing that they be invited to attend at the Committee meeting on the 6<sup>th</sup> instant, being un mindful at the time this direction was given, that the new Cemetery at Rahoon is intended exclusively for the interment

of Roman Catholics, and as such was consecrated by the Bishop of Galway. That it was provided as a substitute for the old Cemetery at Rahoon which has become overcrowded, and which was exclusively a Catholic Cemetery.
