From the information before the Board it would appear that in the absence of any public sewer into which the drainage of the Fever Hospital can be discharged such drainage finds its way into an open ditch, and from thence discharges itself into watercourses in its neighbourhood. Pointing out to the Guardians that the presence of the excreta of patients suffering from enteric (typhoid) fever in open ditches or watercourses is a source of great danger to the health of all persons in the vicinity of the Fever Hospital or living close to such watercourses.

BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

17th Nov 91. Letter from the Rev. J. C. Clarke, placing before the Guardians considerations bearing upon the subject of allocating a portion of the new cemetery at Rahoon for interment of Protestants.

1. When the cemetery at Bohernmore was apportioned as between Roman Catholic and Protestant, it was with the idea that this new cemetery would be for all practical purposes the one place of interment for the people of Salway. It is therefore manifestly unfair to provide a second cemetery at the expense of the general ratepayers and hand it over to the members of one section of the community without even considering the requirements of the other section.

2. The portion for the Protestants in the cemetery at Bohernmore is being taken up much more quickly than the portion for Roman Catholics. That fact should have weight in any rearrangement now made.

3. In the portion for Protestants, the sections marked at a cheap rate have been so rapidly purchased and occupied that in a very limited period, perhaps 4 years or so, there will remain for Protestants no grave spaces under £4 except the corner marked off for paupers. This means that the Protestant poor will suffer great wrong and hardship.

I therefore object to the course proposed to be adopted by the Guardians in regard to Rahoon cemetery and trust that when the Guardians examine the question, they will see that my objection is based on justice and equity, and that they will refuse to adopt a course that would issue in much cruel suffering for the struggling poor.

On the motion of Mr. T. A. Sullivan, seconded Mr. T. Ashe, it was Resolved - that a Committee consisting of the members of the Board who represent the Electoral Divisions comprising the Contributory District for the Rahoon new cemetery, and also members of the Board who are rated within the said District, be summoned to meet at the Board Room at 1.30 p.m. on this day next for the purpose of preparing a scale of charges for Grave Spaces in this cemetery.

Mr. J. Flannery wrote to the Board complaining that two grave spaces ^{in Salway cemetery} purchased by him, have been encroached upon to the extent of three feet. The Superintendent of the cemetery, stated in reply that Mr. Flannery was labouring under a misapprehension, and the matter was referred to the Deputy Vice Chairman of the Board to enquire into.
