The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland or others, relating to Sanitary Matters, were read, and directions given thereon as follows:—

No. 51463/91. } Acknowledging receipt of Minutes of the 9<sup>th</sup> instant  
23<sup>rd</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> } containing an entry of a report from Mr. Quinn, B. E. with respect to the drainage of the Fever Hospital, and with reference thereto and to the resolution adopted by the Guardians on the subject, stating that there are serious objections to the discharge of sewage containing the specific contagium of fever into the river in the manner proposed. The Board however think that if the outfall drain were continued sufficiently far to enable its contents to be discharged into the tidal portion of the river the plan would not be open to such serious objection. Requesting the Guardians to take the matter again into their consideration and to favour the Board with any further observations they may wish to offer.

*The Guardians beg to observe that this subject has already received their most serious consideration. That the construction of an outfall drain sufficiently far to enable its contents to be discharged into the tidal portion of the river would entail a cost of some hundreds of pounds. In fact it would be a difficult matter to estimate the cost.*
