BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

3. that during the 11 years the cemetery at Bohernmore has been open for the interment of members of all religious persuasions, we believe not more than 5 or 6 members of the Presbyterian persuasion have been interred therein, and consequently we believe the Rev. H. Clarke has no grievance in this matter.
4. that when the necessity arises the Guardians will be prepared to take into consideration the question of providing increased accommodation for the interment of members of the Protestant persuasion: that at present the necessity for doing so does not exist.
