14th Sept. 92. From the Solicitor of Public Works acknowledging the receipt of Deed of Conveyance of the site of Pump at Coldwood.

16th Sept. 92. From Mr. J. Perry, M.C. stating that he is prepared to proceed on the order of the Guardians with the plan and section now at the office of the Congested Districts Board. The Rev. P. D. McPulpin writes to say that the water should be brought up as far as the Protestant Church so as to be central in the village. The water from Kilchorra will rise 40 feet higher than the Dispensary corner which was the terminal point of the scheme prepared by him to be carried out as a Relief work. He estimates this work to cost £500. To take it further up with additional fountains, &c. 100

that he does not think an analysis of the water necessary for if Kilchorra water is not sanitary there is no sanitary water on the Island. If the Local Government Board insist upon an analysis it would be advisable to send the water to Dr. Cameron in a stone ware jar holding about half a gallon. The Medical Officer should see that the jar is chemically clean and that it is fairly filled with the water that issues at Kilchorra.

Order - The suggestion re forwarding the water for analysis to be acted upon at once.

16th Sept. 92. From the Secretary to Galway Harbour Commissioners acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the resolution of the Guardians acting as the Coast Sanitary Authority at meeting on the 14th instant. Requesting to be furnished with the names of the ports suspected to be infected with Cholera, and he shall undertake that the resolution shall be carried into effect.

The Clerk informed the Board that he had replied that Liverpool and Glasgow were the ports named up to the present.

17th Sept. 92. From Dr. Keau, Medical Officer of Health of Galway, R. S. Dispensary District, stating that the Rev. P. D. McPulpin in his letter to the Local Government Board respecting the unwhitewashed state of Killeany, Arran Island, is correct in his statement not only as regards Killeany but also all the other villages. No lime has been burned in Arran for over a year, and the difficulty of getting lime from Galway is greater than ever owing to the risk of combustion and consequent danger to the entire cargo as well as to the boat.
