I am in receipt of copy of L. G. Board letter, with reference to D. Kinkead's fee of £2.2.0.

I beg to state I attended the patient on a medical relief ticket and owing to the woman's precarious condition I considered that I required D. Kinkead's assistance as the delay that might accrue from waiting for the Relieving Officer's order to procure me an assistant might prove fatal to the patient. I may also mention that it was late at night when I called him to assist me and at an hour when the Relieving Officer could scarcely be expected to be at the office. I am well aware I should have applied for assistance through the Relieving Officer but the urgency of the case demanded my immediate attention.

"Messrs. J. Grealy, F. Kearns, M. Fallon, G. J. Connor, and Capt. W. S. Waithman met at Galway Cemetery to take into consideration the best and most economical means of gravelling, keeping in repair and free from grass the walks of the Cemetery.

We beg to suggest to your Board that the best means would be to place the walks in the hands of a contractor (with two solvent sureties) to gravel, keep in thorough repair and free from grass the avenue from Entrance Gate to opposite wall, and the cross avenue running from East to West, together with pathways leading to, and around, both chapels.

We consider it unnecessary at present to expend anything on the by-paths as they are rarely used.

Should your Board approve of our suggestions, we would ask you to direct that the Superintendent report to your Board from time to time whether the Contractor is attending to his duties."
