Stating that he will have much pleasure in attending a meeting of the Technical Instruction Committee on any day between the 27th instant and 15th proximo.

Cholera Regulations Proceedings.

12th Sept. '92. From the Superintendent of Customs at Galway informing the Guardians in reply to Clerk's letter of the 8th instant, that the Commissioners of Customs are not prepared to extend to vessels in the coasting trade the application of the regulations under which Masters of vessels in the foreign trade are required on entering a port to answer questions as to the health of all persons on board. Drawing the attention of the Sanitary Authority to their powers as to taking all necessary steps with the view of meeting the danger they apprehend of the risk of infection from other ports more directly in communication with foreign countries.

D. Clements L. S. Medical Inspector pointed out to the Guardians the irregularity of the proceedings at last meeting when the question of providing hospital accommodation for any cases of cholera which might arrive in Galway was referred to the Galway Dispensary Committee, and urged upon the Guardians to take the matter into immediate consideration.

Resolved. That the following members of the Board be added to the Committee appointed at meeting on the 27th of July last, viz. Messrs. J. Healy, H. Redington, D. Curran, J. C. Burke, J. Kearns, C. P. O'Connor, and M. Cunningham. The Committee to be summoned to meet at 3 o'clock on tomorrow.

That we authorise the Harbour Commissioners to instruct the Harbour Master to notify to the Medical Officers of Health the arrival of a vessel coming from

8th Sept. '92.
