The Guardians should at once procure the services of a competent person to act as driver of the Ambulance. The driver of the Ambulance on the occasion referred to was an inmate of the Workhouse, but the female is a paid nurse in the Fever Hospital. Utilising the services of an inmate has worked fairly well so far, and it saves the employment of an outsider at high wages.
