From the Surgeon Captain in Medical Charge of the Station Hospital, Galway, stating that arrangements are being made by the Military Authorities to meet a probable outbreak of Cholera in Galway, and he has been directed by the Principal Medical Officer in Ireland to enquire whether the Sanitary Authority would be willing to admit to their Hospital any soldiers wives or children who may be attacked by that disease; and if so, upon what terms? There is no accommodation at the Barracks for the treatment of soldiers' families.

Order— To be informed that soldiers' <sup>wives</sup> or children shall be admitted to Hospital on the same terms as the general public.

Order— A further application to be made to the Solicitor to the owners of Bran Islands for sanction to the construction of the proposed waterworks at Bran Islands.
