I beg to report that I - at the request of the Collector of Customs - inspected the Barge "Winifred" from Harburgh, cargo of manure east, Capt. Williams, seven hands all told. There was no sickness of any sort, but as a precaution - Harburgh being an infected port, being only thirteen miles from Harburgh, I had all the water pumped out at the roadstead and had the tanks cleaned before she was allowed into dock. In consequence of a letter received today, I again visited the vessel in dock and as there is a large number of empty bags used for the purpose of separating the cargo in bulk, I noticed the Captain and merchant in writing that I, as Sanitary Officer would not allow any bags, canvas or rubbish of any sort to be taken out of the vessel until she shall have gone to sea again. This order will be strictly carried out.
