No. 145/m/92. Adverting to their circular letter of the 4th of November 30th Aug. 93. last, in the fifth paragraph of which the Board drew the attention of Sanitary Authorities to the duty devolving upon them under Section 108 of the Public Health Act, in regard to the periodical inspection of their districts, and requesting to be informed whether the Sanitary Authority have since taken steps to ensure a careful and systematic inspection of their district, with a view to the immediate enforcement of the provisions of the Act in all cases in which nuisances requiring abatement may be found to exist therein. The duty of the Sanitary Authority under the section referred to is one to which, having regard to the probable approach of Cholera in the present year, they should give their earnest and continued attention. The Sanitary Officers have been making periodical inspections in their respective districts. Order that the Sanitary Officers be directed to continue to make careful and systematic inspections of their districts.

Messrs Martin McDonogh, Michael Gill, Martin Galan, Michael Conneely, and Hyles Kelly, wrote a letter to the Guardians stating that they are tenants living in Kilronan, Burren Islands; that they own the land leading from Inbarcarna to the village of Kilronan; that they will not allow any works or water pipes to be placed through their land unless the water be brought to the centre of the village.
