it appears that although the collectors had held
their warrants for nearly two months at the date
referred to, only £685 Poor Rate had been lodged
out of a total of £6,525, while as regards Seed Rate
the lodgments amounted to only £150 out of a total
of £1,617. The Board further observe that Collector
Bailey has not yet lodged any Seed Rate, while
his lodgments of Poor Rate amount to only £273
out of a total of £3,954, and that collector Hannon
has up to the present apparently made no attempt
to collect any Rate in his District. Having regard
to the fact that the balance at foot of the Treasurer's
Account against the Guardians is £654, the Board
have to point out that the Guardians should adopt

some

some measures to compel the collectors, especially
the Officers named to discharge their duties with more
efficiency and to make satisfactory weekly lodgments.
Order. The several Rate collectors to be cautioned that unless
they discharge their duties with more efficiency the Guardians
will have to adopt measures to compel them to do so,
and an extra caution to be given to collectors Bailey
and Hannon, the latter to be called upon to make
a lodgment of Rates forthwith.

BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

13th Feby. '93. Letter from Messrs Somerville and Coghlan, Engineers, acknowledging the receipt of letter directing them to substitute a skylight for the window that overlooks Mr. Gilmore's land adjoining the new Cemetery Lodge at Rahoon, and stating that before instructing the Contractor for the building of the Lodge to make the alteration proposed they feel it their duty to inform the Guardians that the cost of same will be about £4, and that at the same time it will practically render a room in the Lodge useless except for a storeroom. Acknowledging receipt of Minutes of the 8th instant 14th Feby. in which the Guardians request that an increased loan of £350 may be granted for Kibronan Water-works, and inquiring what arrangements have been made with regard to obtaining the requisite land and water rights referred to in the Board's letter of the 20th of December last.

The Guardians have on two occasions applied to the Solicitor to the owners for the land and water rights and await a reply.

9th Feby. 93. From the Secretary to the Town Commissioners, the Urban Sanitary Authority, enclosing an extract from a communication which they have received from the Local Government Board on the subject of the arrangements existing in the district for the isolation and treatment of any cases of Cholera that may arise, in which reference is made to the sanitary condition of the Fever Hospital, and requesting

requesting that the Guardians will take the necessary steps to have the drainage of the Hospital which is at present discharged into the water course leading to Muns Island altered in such a manner as to avoid this most objectionable means of drainage.
