Cholera Regulations Proceedings.

Mr. A. Suple submitted his account for the creation of the Intercepting Hospital at Peunmore Point, amount £260. 16. 6, and an order for payment was made. Mr. Suple's tender for the sheeting, &c. of the Nurses' rooms as recommended by the Committee, amount £4, was accepted.

Resolved. That the Committee be entrusted to carry out the following details, viz.:

To have the water pipe laid on to the Intercepting Hospital; to provide beds and bedding; a cooking stove with large water boiler attached, in the Kitchen, and the necessary Kitchen utensils; a small stove for the Ward; pails to be placed under the closets; two barrels to catch rain water from the roofs. The beds and bedding, &c. to be kept in a store in the Workhouse for the present.

Acting on the suggestion of Dr. Clewents, L. G. Inspector, the following resolution was passed.

Resolved. That the Cholera Regulations Committee be empowered to confer with a Committee of the Town Commissioners, the Urban Sanitary Authority, with the view to acting conjointly in taking the necessary measures to make provision for dealing with any general outbreak of Cholera in the Galway District.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland or others, relating to Sanitary Matters, were read, and directions given thereon as follows:—

23 Feb. 93. From Mr. Perry, M.C. stating that in carrying out the Inan Waterworks, private ground will not be occupied. The supply reservoir is to be excavated in rock at a wide portion of a common breen at the springs. The pipe will run along either the breen public path or the public road. There is one little field through which the stream runs and the owner or occupier of this field might, if he were disposed to be troublesome, say that his water was being taken, but except very rarely the works will not take all the water. If he insisted upon it we might require to give him a small pipe and trough. This would cost only about £3, but as it might involve a constant waste of water taken from a point in front of the public supply he should prefer not to do it. In his (Mr. Perry's) opinion the man will always have plenty of water from the overflow, but if this is found to fail at any time he can get a compensatory pipe as before stated. This person is the only one concerned in compensation and so far he has made no objection.

The Clerk informed the Guardians that on receipt of

of Mr. Perry's letter he forwarded a copy of it to the Solicitor to the owners of Inan Island Estate, with a request that the consent of the owners would be obtained at an early date to enable the Guardians to proceed with the work as the fishing season has now commenced at Inan Islands.

In response to advertisements tenders were received for the supply of pipes, valves, &c. delivered free and in good order at Galway, and for carrying out and completing the works.

The tenders of Messrs J. Blakeborough & Sons for the supply of the pipes, valves, &c. amount £263.3.3, and of Messrs C. O'Haherty & J. Hamilton for carrying out and completing the works, amount £379.10.0, were accepted conditionally, that the loan applied for be obtained.

The Cholera Regulations Committee furnished a report of their proceedings at a meeting held on the 23rd ultimo, in pursuance of the resolution of the Board at last meeting. The Committee hope to be in a position to report to the Board at meeting on the 8th instant, as to all requisites for the Intercepting Hospital and their cost.

The Committee met the Committee appointed by the Urban Sanitary Authority on the same date, and the following resolution was passed.

Resolved. That in case of an epidemic of Cholera in Galway, the Port Sanitary Authority be requested to permit the Urban Sanitary Authority to erect Hospital Sheds on the ground taken by it for an Intercepting Hospital.
