Gentlemen,

I received Mr. Muller's letter of the 8th instant giving me notice that proceedings would be taken against my sureties and myself for the recovery of the sum of £200.9.1. I am sure I will spare the gentlemen of the Board of Guardians the trouble of taking proceedings against my sureties or myself. I have sent Mr. Cronjier a bill last April for the amount of rates due by the owners of the Islands of Arran for the sum of £102.19.8 $\frac{1}{2}$. I did not expect to get it any sooner than after Mr. Robinson would receive his rents in Arran.

During Mr. Robinson's stay in Arran through sickness I was unable to see him until he left. I have written to Mr. Cronjier and told him unless that he sent the amount either to you or myself on or before the 21st that I would take proceedings against the owners for same. As soon as the owners pay I will close my collection. It is the gentlemen of the Board belief or the most of them that do not know the trouble of collecting rates in Arran on account of me not attending monthly for the examination of my books that I must have done away with the £200.9.1. I own that I am in fault myself for not attending oftener. I am unable to attend this week. I did not go outside doors since yesterday week. I expect to be able to attend next week.

With reference to Dr. Kirwan's letter and report of the sanitary state of John Costello's premises the Committee consider it best to have him adopt and carry out the best mode he can of having the nuisance abated.

With reference to the dispute reported, as between the Medical Officer and the Relieving Officer, the Committee having investigated the matter consider that referring to their Minutes of the 11th April last, the Medical Officer was justified in asking the Relieving Officer to leave the Dispensary as there were patients present.
