Read Letter from D. Kirwan, Cranmore, dated 11th July, 1893, stating that

" on the 1st ultimo he prosecuted a number of defaulters under the Compulsory Vaccination Act, and succeeded in the majority of the cases but in three cases he failed to convict although the children ranged from 7 months to 13 months old. In no instance did the parents comply with the Law or attempt to prove they did, viz: that they produced their children for Vaccination before 3 months of age. Owing to the manner that these cases are dealt with, he must decline in future acting as prosecutor unaided, but will be willing to do so with the aid of the Guardians' Solicitor, as he purposes paying for the summonses in which there was no conviction he requests an order for the usual fee."
