D. Colahan applied for, and obtained leave of absence for a month. D. Hyden to discharge his duties during his absence.

Major Rutledge-Fair, L. G. Inspector, said he attended this meeting specially to point out to the Guardians the importance of providing really good milk for the inmates of the Workhouse as it is an important item in the dietary of the paupers. That the existing arrangement—whereby the Contractors are punished by having the price of milk supplied under the standard forfeited, is not satisfactory as the paupers suffer also when the milk supplied is poor, and in the Minutes of each meeting there is a report of milk being received under the standard.

He suggested the adoption of a plan which has proved very satisfactory in other Unions, namely, to enter into a contract with one or two persons for the supply of milk for a term of three or five years. In giving a contract for only one year it does not pay a contractor to go to the expense of providing plant and a good class of milch cows.

Resolved—That a special meeting of the Board be summoned for this day week to take into consideration the subject of the supply of milk to the Workhouse, and to determine whether a contract

be entered into with one or more persons for a term of one, three, or five years.

Sanitary Sub Officer J. J. McNeill reported that there were 3 defaulters under the Sanitary Act from the Moycullen Dispensary District summoned to Petty Sessions Court at Moycullen on the 29<sup>th</sup> instant. Mr. Gardiner, P. M., the presiding Magistrate asked the Solicitor to the Board who was in attendance to appear for the Guardians and he complied. One case was withdrawn, and in the other two cases the defendants were allowed 7 days to comply with the law. Costs were not given.

*The Guardians expressed disapproval of the action of the presiding Magistrate in asking a Solicitor to appear for the Guardians without their approval.*

Dr. Conolly, Medical Officer of Health for the Moycullen Dispensary District, forwarded a certificate of the presiding Magistrate that he (Dr. Conolly) appeared as a witness in court at the hearing of the above-mentioned cases, but there was no order for payment of a fee.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland or others, relating to Sanitary Matters were read, and directions given thereon as follows:—

Mr. Perry, M.P. submitted a letter he received from the Contractor for laying the water pipes at Arran Islands, in which complaint was made that a man named Michael Conneely to whom compensation was given for his sanction to lay the water pipes in his fields, had prevented the Contractor going on his land.

Mr. Perry pointed out that if Conneely assaults the Contractor or his men there is the usual remedy at law.

*Order - The Contractor to be so informed.*

The Contractor also complains that he has not been supplied with a sufficient number of bends. The Guardians are not bound to supply any more bends than already agreed upon. It is altogether a question of cutting the pipe trench straight or crooked. The circumstances in Arran are peculiar owing to the way the rock occurs.

It will be a matter altogether for the Guardians to consider after the work is completed whether equity requires from them some little consideration on this question of bends which in any case cannot amount to more than £5.
