The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

12<sup>th</sup> June 1894. Adverting to Minutes of the 6<sup>th</sup> instant, and expressing their sanction to the proposed payment of 5/- a week for a period of one month to the person employed for cutting up the meat supplied for the use of the Workhouse.

12<sup>th</sup> June 1894. Adverting to Minutes of the 6<sup>th</sup> instant and to previous correspondence on the subject, and requesting to be informed of the reason for payment being made to M. Derrane, for discharging the duties of temporary Relieving Officer from the 26<sup>th</sup> March last, and not the 11<sup>th</sup> April, the date of the late Relieving Officer's death.

The Guardians beg to refer the Local Government Board to Board Letter No. 62/2/94, dated the 19<sup>th</sup> February, in which permission was given for the

employment of Roger Derrane for a period of three months, on conditions that M. Hernon's salary be applied to the payment of the remuneration of his substitute. Immediately after receipt of this letter, Roger Derrane entered on the duties of Relieving Officer, but there was an arrangement entered into between M. Derrane and the late M. Hernon, who was his father-in-law, and in whose house he resided, that the latter was to be paid the salary up to the 25<sup>th</sup> March last, and M. Derrane the salary for the remaining portion of the period of leave of absence. Awaiting the sanction to the new appointment caused the Guardians to continue M. Derrane in office till the 30<sup>th</sup> ultimo. M. Hernon died on 25<sup>th</sup> March last.

has been employed as Workhouse Tailor for the past 28 years, be allowed a retiring allowance at the rate of six shillings a week during the remainder of his life time, and that we request the sanction of the Local Government Board thereto.

The motion was seconded by Mr. M. Cunningham and carried unanimously.
