The Board are of opinion that, having regard to the report received from the Dispensary Medical Officer relative to Mr. Hernon's state of health, the Guardians should consider whether they will not either call for the Relieving Officer's resignation, or appoint some person to discharge all the duties of his office for a period of say three months.

A copy of this letter to be furnished to Relieving Officer Hernon and that he be informed that the Guardians are willing to grant him leave of absence for three months, and to appoint his son-in-law, Roger Derrane, to act as his substitute and to discharge all the duties of his office, provided he allows his salary for the three months, £8.15.0, to his substitute, and that the latter accept this amount as remuneration for his services.
