In compliance with your request I beg to furnish particulars of residence of the two children named Thomas and Mark Folan at present inmates of the Workhouse.

At date of admission Thomas was 5 years and Mark 3 years of age. They were born in their grandfather's house at Keagh Townland, Electoral Division of Slieveaneena, and resided there with their mother until February, 1892, when they went with their mother and grandfather to reside in Longwell Townland, Electoral Division of Turbough, and continued to live there till removed to the Workhouse on 23<sup>rd</sup> November, 1892. They have been inmates of the Workhouse since that date.

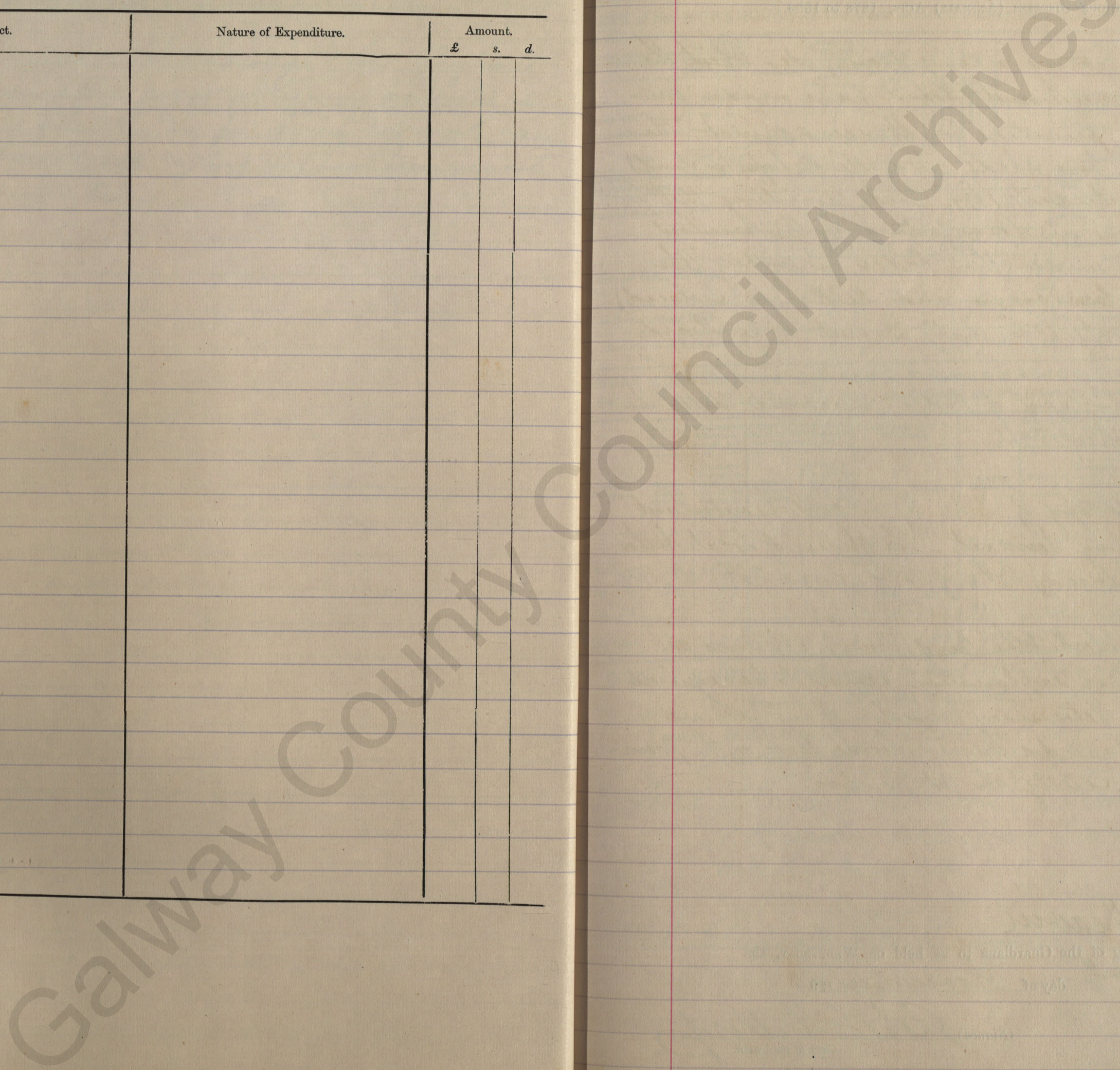

Major F. Fair, L.S. Inspector visited the Fever Hospital yesterday. He directed that some ivy be planted round the walls.

An able-bodied inmate named Arthur Dunleavy refused to work and made use of threatening language to me. I reported him for similar misconduct on previous occasions.
