Small-pox; informing the Guardians that some cases have recently occurred in Dublin, and that isolated cases of the disease have been reported to the Board from Londonderry and Waterford, owing to the infectious nature of the disease it is most necessary that prompt and effectual measures should be taken in all Sanitary Districts to prevent its spreading; and drawing the attention of the Sanitary Authority and their Officers to the necessity that exists for the exercise of great vigilance in ascertaining as early as possible the particulars of any cases of small-pox that may occur, and for taking the utmost precautions

to prevent the extension of this formidable disease, Enumerating the most effectual means, in the opinion of the Board, for preventing its spread, Also, enclosing copies of the Board's Circular letter of the 5th of December, 1892, and requesting that the Medical Officer of Health of each District be directed to report at once to the Local Government Board any case of the disease which may occur in his district so as to enable the Board to confer with the Sanitary Authority in dealing with the outbreak.

Copies of both Circular letters are forwarded for distribution among the Medical Officers of Health and other Officers of the Sanitary District.

Order— Each medical officer of the Union to be furnished with copies of Circular letters dated 5th Decr. 1892, and 3rd July, 1894, and to be directed to report at once to the Local Government Board any case which may occur in his district.
