The following members of the Visiting Committee met at the Workhouse on Tuesday, 24<sup>th</sup> July, 1894, to take into consideration the half yearly report of the Local Government Inspector, viz. Messrs P. Harmon, J. C. MacDonnell, M. Davoren, ~~and~~ M. Cunningham & A. G. Scott.

The Committee consider the several lavatories in the Workhouse in good order, except the one on the female side for able and infirm inmates. They recommend a roof being erected similar to the arrangement on the male side.

Before winter sets in a stove should be placed in No 4 female infirm ward for heating purposes.

A small plot of ground be laid out in the garden for the exclusive use of the boys and to enable the Schoolmaster to give them practical instruction in agriculture.

The sheeting of the floors of some of the Hospital Wards with light timber, would not, in the opinion of the Committee prove very satisfactory, and they defer recommending the heavy outlay of ceiling until the Union be in a better financial state.

An estimate should be obtained for the supply of new heating flues in the laundries.

The wainscoting in the Workhouse Chapel should be repaired before the painting commences. A small table and six new cots are needed in the Infants Ward.

The coping of the walls of the Boys and Girls Yards should be repaired - ~~and~~

The white Bread in the Store was dark in colour and altogether not up to a fair standard. The Brown Bread, Meat, and Milk were of good quality.

The Committee recommend that the Workhouse Porter be called upon to resign as he has reached an age that precludes an active discharge of his duties. They feel assured the Guardians will take into consideration his long service of 28 years and vote him a retiring allowance.

The Committee do not consider it necessary to call upon the Porter of the Fever Hospital to resign, but they cautioned him to be more particular in keeping the grounds in order in future.

They recommend whitewashing of the Fever Hospital premises. The gable fronting the public road requires having the joints raked out and newly cemented as dampness is shown on the walls inside. The walls of the Matron's room are very damp; the joints of the roof having rotted away require to be renewed.

The Committee recommend a flush channel being laid in cement in the back yard, and tidy flush cisterns and new pans be provided for the male and female closets.

#### Mr. Bailey's Rate Collection.

The Committee consider the present state of his collection most unsatisfactory. That there is nothing to prevent him closing his Collection within the specified time if he only used due diligence. That he should be called

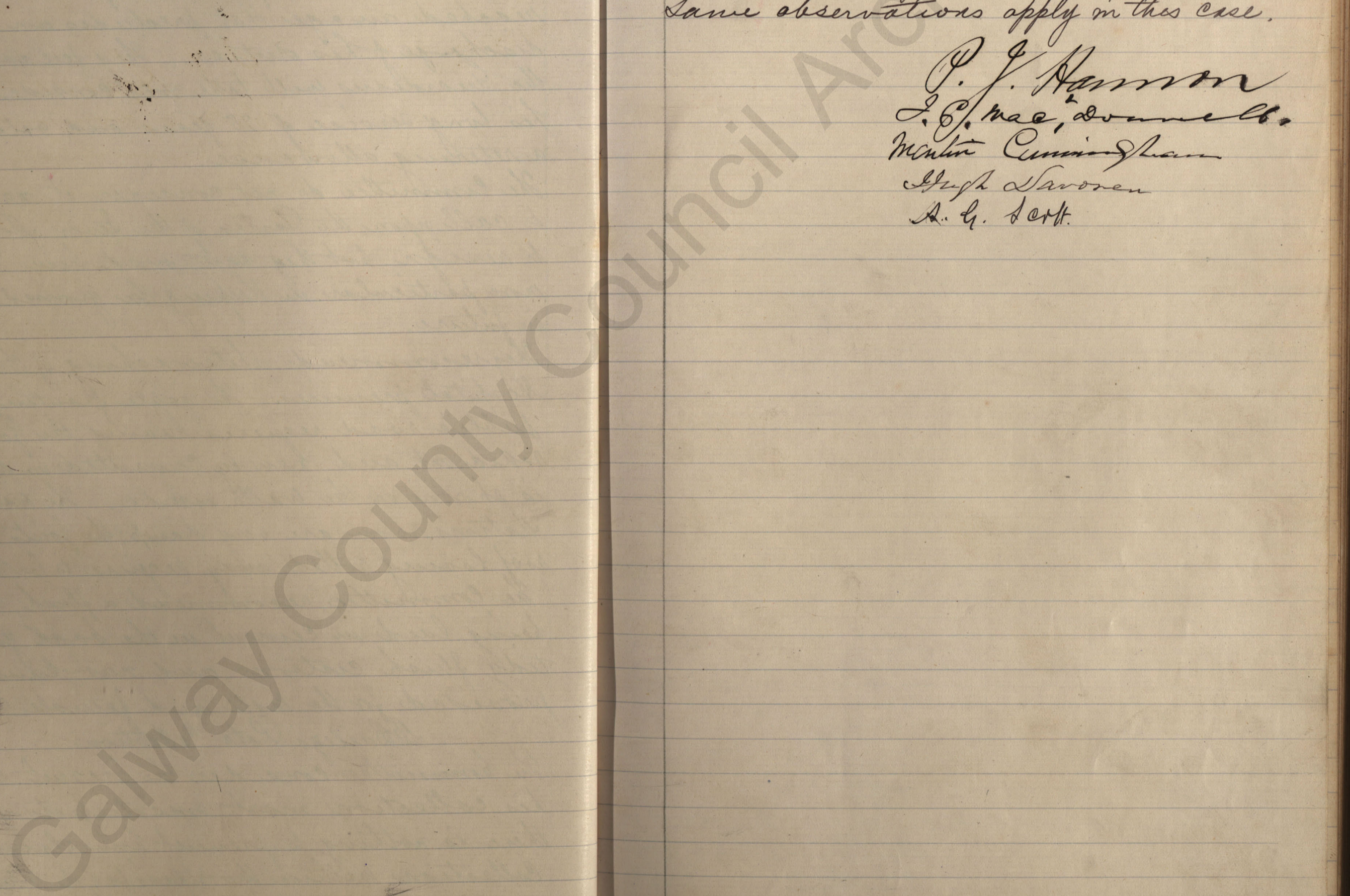

PROCEEDINGS of the BOARD of GUARDIANS as LOCAL AUTHORITY under the CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACTS, 1878 to 1890.

18<sup>th</sup> July '94. From the Clerk of the Council, Privy Council Offices, Dublin Castle, stating that he has been directed by the Lords Justices to acknowledge the receipt of Clerk's letter of the 12<sup>th</sup> instant, drawing attention to the action of the Magistrates at Galway Petty Sessions on the 9<sup>th</sup> instant, in dismissing (without prejudice) a case of prosecution for contravention of the Regulations as to dogs made by the Board of Guardians of Galway Union as the local Authority under article 10 of the Rabies (Ireland) Order of 1888, on the ground that the Local Authorities are not empowered to enforce the snuffing of dogs except when Rabies exists in their District.

In reference thereto acquainting the Local Authority that their Excellencies are advised that the Local Authority were quite within their rights in making the regulations of the 29<sup>th</sup> February, 1888; and that if the Magistrates maintain the same view as that mentioned on a future occasion, they might be asked to state a case for the High Court.
