Explanation from Dr. Kean, Medical Officer of Galway No. 3, Dispensary District, (Borran Islands).

4th Sept. '94. "Have received Clerk's letter of the 30th ultimo and copy of Flaherty's letter. It is quite true I refused to attend Flaherty at the Dispensary without a ticket, or to sell him plaster there, but that did not put him to any inconvenience for he knew perfectly well what to do, and he did it. He came to my own house to have his wound dressed and I dressed it, and this fact is dishonestly suppressed by Flaherty or by the person who writes the letter for him. But the point on which the whole case turns occurred later on when Flaherty came to me a second time for treatment. On that occasion his face was black and swollen and I advised him to give up his work for the day, to go to his lodging and lie down in bed when I would follow and dress his wound. I told him at the same time I must now get my fee. I said something like this, "I dressed your wound once without charge, but you cannot expect me to go on attending you for nothing when you are earning good wages." "How much will you charge?" "Five shillings." "Oh Roger will give me a ticket."

This is what was said and what led up to the getting of the ticket."

Dr. Kinnlead points out that while this omission does not affect pay patients who may be admitted on the Medical Officer's orders, the inconvenience is especially felt when the applicants are poor persons properly chargeable to the rates, as these persons must await the next meeting of the Guardians in
