Seed Potatoes Supply.

1887/95 } From L. G. B. referring to minutes of the
13th April } 10th instant and to the Guardians resolution
of the 3rd instant in which ^{it was} ~~they~~ stated
that 200 families in Arran Islands
were in want of seed, and stating that
any applications made to the Guardians
on their behalf should be favourably
considered.

Pointing out that the question as to
the nature and amount of security is
one which calls for serious consideration
but a matter entirely for the Guardians
themselves to determine.

15th April 95 } From Andrews & Co, Coleraine, Contractors
for the supply of potatoes to the Union
requesting the Guardians to amend
their Contract by increasing the
price $7/6$ per ton so as to recoup
them for the expenses they have
incurred in connection with the
re-picking^g of the potatoes, &c.

The Guardians refused to have the
Contract so amended.

On the motion of Mr A. E. Scott, seconded
by Mr P. J. Burke, it was unanimously
Resolved - That in reply to the letter
of the L. G. B. of the 13th April, in which
it is stated that any applications for
seed made to the Guardians on behalf
of the destitute families in Arran
should be favourably considered;
this statement is based on a thorough
misunderstanding of the position
of the Guardians as to the condition
of the people referred to. The Guardians
have already supplied seed to all
who applied for them on the Islands,
but the people they refer to are those
who have not applied for seed and who
therefore could not be refused, who
besides are unable to pay for seed and
unable to get security and therefore
the Guardians would violate the Act
by giving seed without security.

The Guardians would again state they
know of no means by which they can
supply these destitute people with
seed within the Seed Act, and they
are alarmed for the probable condition
next harvest in case their lands are
allowed to go fallow this Spring,
and they may be compelled to become a
burden on the rates this year and next.

The Guardians would point out that
the rates are already $4/7$ in the £; besides
that the people referred to gave notice to

The Guardians in the beginning that they did not intend to apply for seed when they had no means to pay for them or unable to get security. We therefore request the L.G.B. to ask the Government to provide a free grant for seed this being the only way in our opinion in which seed can be obtained. We would refer the L.G.B. to D. Clements reports and finally we would say that if the people of Aran suffer for the want of seed it will not be the fault of the Guardians.

The Guardians - as has been explained oft and again - have no power to act under the Seed Supply Act, as the people who require the seed are in the deplorable condition of being without means and without credit. We feel it to be our bounden duty again to urge on the local Government Board the urgent necessity of that body representing to the proper Government Department that a free grant of seed should be made to those poor people, ^{as} even now, or up to the first week in May will not be too ~~late~~ ^{advanced} in the season, to provide seed to those poor people who have their land already prepared for sowing. Finally the Guardians wish to state that they warn the Government through the local Government Boards, that they cannot be held ^{answerable} responsible for the consequences if those people are not relieved by a free grant of seed.
