Orders. The attention of the Constabulary to be directed to the number of dogs that are constantly straying about Galway, and to be informed that the Guardians decide that their special regulations made under the Rabies (Ireland) Order of 1886 be enforced.

Circular from the Privy Council Office, Dublin Castle, to the local authorities in Ireland, subject "Rabies". It is considered desirable that in a doubtful case of Rabies in a dog or cat, the existence of Rabies in the animal should be verified by a person possessed of special qualifications for the purpose. Such investigations cannot yet be conveniently carried out at Dublin Castle, and until further arrangements are made, Professor John F. McFadyen, Principal of the Royal Veterinary College, Camden Town, London, N.W. is prepared to undertake these investigations at a fee of £2 in each case, payable by the local authority at whose instance the examination is made. It will be sufficient to send the head of the animal in cheap glycerine in a tin canister, either soldered down or securely fastened with sealing wax. Where the services of a Veterinary Surgeon can be secured, only the brain need be sent, which should be despatched at the earliest possible moment.

Resolved - In case a human being be bitten by a dog or cat considered to be rabid by the Veterinary Inspector for the Union, the brain of the animal to be at once despatched as suggested.
