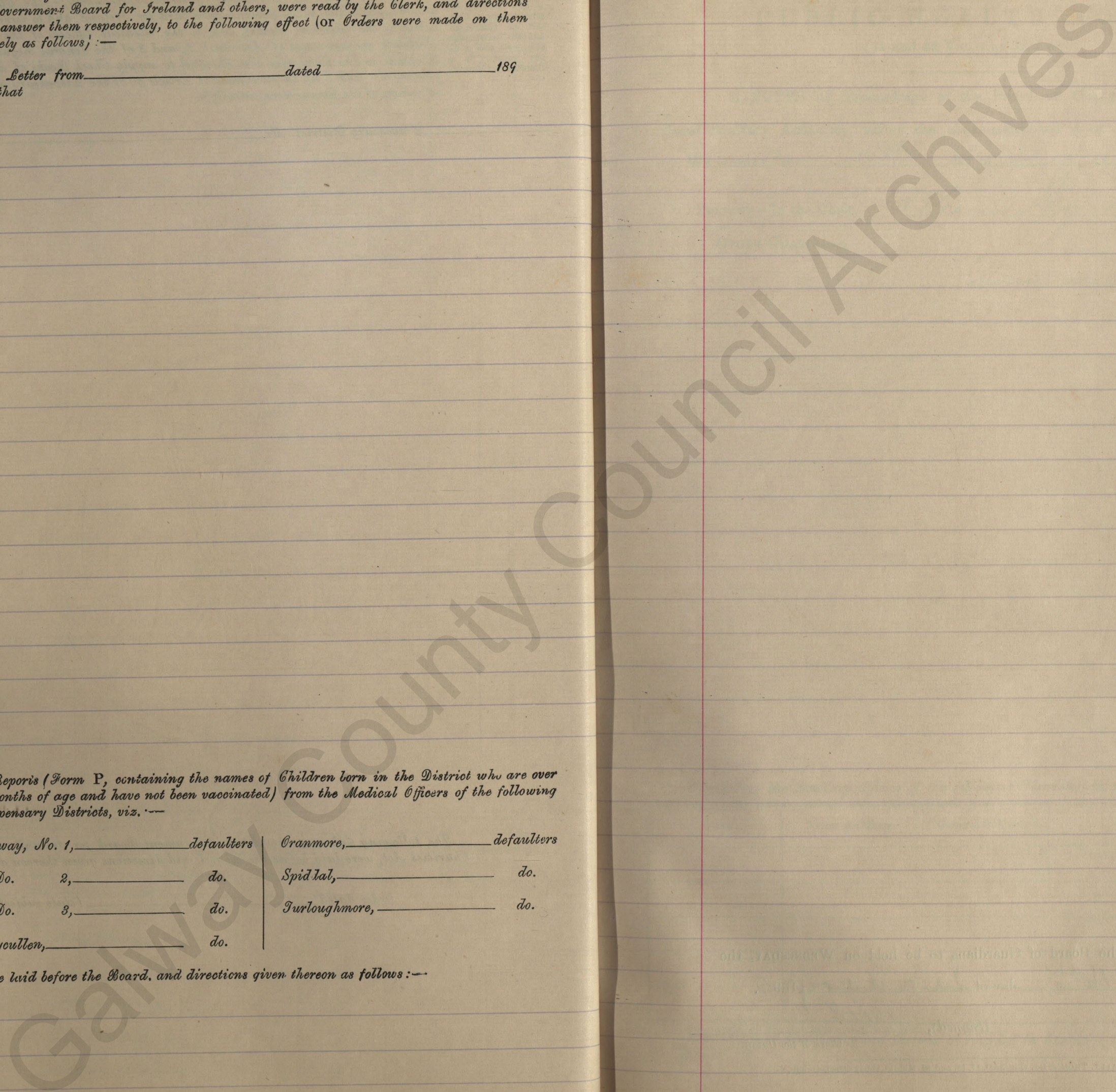

owing to the note made by the Auditor on 22nd March, 1894, calling attention to articles 18 & 19 of the Workhouse Rules, the Medical Officers of the Workhouse are precluded from affording medical comforts in the shape of nourishment and stimulants to the sick & dying in the Infirmary Wards, & those who are not in a fit state to be removed to Hospital.

We recommend that the Medical Officers be allowed discretionary powers to give nourishment & stimulants to such persons, and also to delicate school children where the Medical Officers do not consider it desirable to remove them to Hospital.

We submit a list of Workhouse Hospital Daily Diets with alterations therein, which we recommend the Board to adopt. The alterations have been recommended by the Medical Officers.

We recommend the acceptance of Mr. P. McDonald's tender for repairs of the Laundry Drying closet, and providing and erecting a Boiler in the Laundry, but the Boiler must be wrought iron, instead of cast-iron, as mentioned in the tender.

The Committee regret the necessity of strongly condemning the Engineer's neglect to see that the stoves were properly set & in working order.

order in the Infirmary Wards, as his neglect of duty caused the poor old inmates to be deprived of the comfort of a fire during the coldest season of the year.

We feel the greatest pleasure in reporting that we found the Girls and Infants School in perfect order, exquisitely clean & neat in all respects; same to be said of the children who treated us to a musical performance. Credit for this satisfactory state of affairs is entirely due to the Lady in charge of the School.

The Boys' School we regret to say affords a striking contrast as a want of cleanliness & tidiness generally is apparent.

The report of the Master calling attention to acts of inefficiency on my part has come upon me by surprise, and in giving your Board an explanation of these charges I hope they will be found satisfactory. I take them as they appear in his report. 1. As regards the opening of the door: it was I opened the door on the night in question. I was getting the schoolroom fitted up to prepare for a festival which was to take place the following day, twelfth day, and given by the Nuns to the children. Being in want of water I opened the door and under my own supervision sent out a boy to get some. Certainly he did not run round the yard as stated in the report. These facts and circumstances I explained to the Master and in no impolite language. 2. As to the unnecessary noise of the boys resulting from my not seeing them into bed at night. Now anyone acquainted with the mechanical arrangements of school management knows that the great aim of a Teacher is to command

order

order and discipline. It is a matter of practical interest to his health and happiness and seeing that the good discipline of the boys is an undisputed fact, and also that they are as orderly going in to bed as they are at any time of the day. I contradict the statement that they are heard all over the place. I see them into bed every night giving them a limited amount of time to get in. And if I have occasion to get in to my room, they are not left by themselves, being in charge of a proper man who sleeps with them. 3. As to taking the children out for exercise, the school hours leave no margin of time to take them out in midwinter.
