7th Nov. 95. Circular from the Clerk of Union, Carlow, forwarding a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Guardians of that Union as follows:—

Resolved—

"That we, the Members of the Carlow Board of Guardians, desire to place on record our marked disapproval of the high-handed action of the Local Government Board in suspending from their duties the Guardians elected by the people in the Athlone Poor Law Union, and appointing in their place Paid Guardians without good cause or sufficient legal authority, thus depriving the people of their legal representation, and wantonly increasing their taxation by over £500 a year, the salary allotted to these gentlemen.

"That this Board considers the authority of the Local Government Board in this case so doubtful, and the question of such importance, that they suggest that all Boards of Guardians in this country should co-operate with the Suspended Members of the Athlone Board, and have the question tried in the Court of Queen's Bench; and that this Board undertakes to pay £2 towards the necessary legal expenses.

"That copies of the above Resolution be sent to each Board of Guardians in Ireland, to be considered by them, and to the Chief Secretary for Ireland."

On the motion of Mr. W. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. P. Kearns, this resolution was adopted.

9th Nov. 95. Circular from the Clerk of Union, Westport, forwarding a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Guardians of that Union as follows:—

Resolved—

"That the Guardians of the Westport Union, while most anxious to carry out the reforms suggested by the Local Government Board in the Workhouse to increase the comfort and well-being of the poor inmates committed to their charge, cannot but feel that such a large expenditure as would be necessary to carry out those suggestions was never contemplated under the Poor Law Acts, particularly as the Workhouses were built originally by the Government, and therefore any structural alterations should be made by them, and the Guardians are of opinion that a Government Grant in aid of those improvements should be made by Parliament to the different Unions throughout Ireland, so that they may be carried out to the satisfaction of the Local Government Board."

"That copies of the resolution be sent to every Union in Ireland, to the members of Parliament for the county of Mayo, the Chief Secretary, and to the First Lord of the Treasury."

On the motion of Mr. W. McDonogh, seconded by Mr. P. Burke, this resolution was unanimously adopted.

If these were ordinary articles we should at once recommend the acceptance of the lowest tender, but in the case of drugs the strength and purity can only be established by difficult and repeated analysis, it may be doubted whether it is well to be bound to the lowest tender. Some of the prices quoted appeared to be below the cost price of the articles. On the whole we are disposed to advise the Board to accept the tender of Messrs Harrington. We have taken into account that they are manufacturing Chemists, that they specially guarantee the percentage strength of their goods, and that they have given satisfaction in former contracts. We say this without any reflection whatever on the other firms who have tendered.
