Report of the Visiting Committee

Nursing in the Union Hospital.

We have given our best and most careful consideration to the question of the nursing in the Union Hospital, and we are strong in our conviction that the present system is admirable and most efficient in its operation. We visited the Hospital throughout the different wards, and everywhere we were most favorably impressed with the condition of things we found existing, both as regards the arrangements made for the comfort and well being of the patients, as well as the order, discipline and cleanliness which we observed in each portion visited.

We have considered the suggestion made by Dr Lyden in his letter sent to the Board, and read at last meeting, relative to the night nursing, and we are of opinion that it would be very desirable to have a responsible and competent person appointed to be under the direction of the Nuns and to see that their instructions to the night-nurses would be carried out strictly and also the person so appointed to assist in the night nursing.

Beds & Bedding } In Dr Lyden's No. 1. Male Ward we recommend that two wire-wove mattresses would be procured, and fitted to two iron bedsteads at present in use, and in Dr Lyden's No. 1. female ward we recommend for the proper treatment of surgical cases that

that three new iron bedsteads of approved pattern (same as are generally used in Hospitals) with wire wove mattresses, and furnished with hair mattresses would be substituted for three of the beds now in use in the wards.

In Dr. Colahan's No. 1. Male ward we recommend that five wire wove mattresses, would be procured, to fit sizes of iron bedsteads now in use in the ward. We consider this to be necessary for the proper treatment of surgical cases. We also recommend that two hair mattresses be procured for use in this ward.

Ceiling } We recommend that No. 3. Male ward (Dr. Chapman's
of Ward) be ceiled, and that the walls of the ward would be plastered. We consider those improvements to be absolutely necessary, as the ward is quite too cold and uncomfortable for delicate patients during the winter season.

Female } We are of opinion that it would incur
Infirmary } lavish, unnecessary and imprudent expenditure of money to think of rebuilding this house. The roof may require to be strengthened, and we think our Engineer would be able to devise a plan - not incurring much outlay - that would put it in a safe and satisfactory condition. The floor of the upper female ward is not good or satisfactory, and

we would recommend that a new floor of strong boards, tongued and grooved would be put in. At present when this floor is washed the water goes through the joints in the flooring and injures the bed covering in the ward underneath.

In connection ^{with} these proposed improvements we would wish to say that in view of the present high rates in the Union, and its financial condition generally, we were most cautious and particular not to incur any outlay, except what we considered absolutely necessary.

Schools. We visited the female and male schools, and found the children at their school exercises. They were clean and orderly and we found the school rooms in a neat condition.

Provisions. We examined in the stores the milk, meat, and bread. The milk and meat we considered satisfactory and of good quality, but we were not so well pleased with the quality of the bread, as we considered the large loaves (4 lbs) not up to a fair standard of quality. We requested the Master to bring a couple of the loaves we examined and place them before the Board at their Meeting on tomorrow in order to give them an opportunity of judging for themselves.

Sanitary
Arrangements

We consider that the sanitary arrangements in the house, are good and satisfactory. As a still further improvement of a useful nature we would recommend the erection of a urinal in each of the water closets in the Male wards. (3)

Cooking
Utensils
&c.

We are of opinion that there is an ample supply of cooking utensils, knives and forks &c in use in the house; and the inmates are provided with knives, forks and spoons at their meals.

We are pleased to say that in our general visitation and inspection of the house, we found every department orderly, clean and well kept.

Dr Colahan's Report.

With reference to the communication from the L.G. Board of the 27th June, and the Guardians request for a report from their Medical officers on certain matters mentioned in same. I beg to say I attended a meeting of the Visiting Committee some time ago, which was summoned by the Clerk. A considerable time was spent in visiting the house and the several wards of the Hospital. As my views entirely coincide with those expressed in the report then drawn up and subsequently I believe laid before your Board, I beg to append a copy of same.

With regard to the question of nursing which has been left to your Medical officers I beg to report

Workhouse

That the nursing of the sick in the several departments of the Workhouse both in and outside the Hospital is carried out by inmates of the house under the supervision of the Sisters in Charge.

As the "able body" class of women, particularly by those without children, has almost disappeared from the house, serious difficulty arises at times in finding suitable women to undertake the work, which is frequently done under protest. There is much room for improvement in this direction, and the entire question of pauper help in the Workhouse, and the difficulties surrounding it would with

advantage form the subject of a special inquiry by the Guardians

The daily average number of patients in the Workhouse Hospital is over 89. The sole charge of these patients during the night is in the hands of a male and female pauper - and condition of things that cannot commend itself to anyone.

Lying-in
Hosp^l } With regard to the Lying-in Hospital I beg to report that a qualified nurse has been appointed by the Guardians to attend to the women confined in this Ward. She is not required to give her whole time to the place and only pays periodical visits to the place when called upon. In every way the system is a bad one. Women after their confinement require the constant attendance of the nurse night and day for several days. Under the present system women are of necessity for hours together without the services of the nurse, consequently duties have frequently to be undertaken by whatever pauper helper may be in the place - of which she is quite incapable.

Fever-
Hosp^l } The Guardians have appointed a Matron to the Fever Hospital - a trained nurse of many years experience. The Matron has further the assistance of a probationer who has six months training in Dublin Hospitals before commencing duty at the Fever Hospital. The Hospital has lately undergone extensive repairs. A new laundry has been fitted up in the newest

and most approved style. A new dead house has been built away from the Hospital, and the sanitary arrangements have been made as perfect as possible. In every way the Institution is in a most satisfactory condition, with one exception - the disinfecting chamber or stove. This has done its work and is almost useless, and as it is of an old fashioned and obsolete kind it should be replaced to one of newer design.

I may mention here that there is no means of any kind in the workhouse for disinfecting clothes. Filthy clothes often covered with vermin are taken off the paupers on their admission, and in this condition stored - to be given to them again on leaving the house.

Hospital

Beds. 1) The present bedsteads in use should be replaced as they are not suitable for modern medical requirements. Iron bedsteads with wire woven mattresses (Hospital K pattern 2ft x 6ft) are most suitable. Upon the requisition of the Medical Officer flock mattresses should be also obtained

when required for the use of patients requiring special treatment

- (2) The walls of the male Infirmary Wards should be plastered and ceiled
- (3) A few additional ventilators are also required.

(4) The female Infirmary which was originally built in 1849, for a cholera shed is incapable for the requirements of the patients - it is too low and narrow, and is also in other respects faulty. We think the Guardians should consider carefully the propriety of rebuilding this Ward as we consider no really permanent improvement can be otherwise effected.

Nursing. We leave the question of nursing to be dealt with by the Medical Officers who have been directed to report to you.

Sanitary Arrangements } Five new closets and two bath rooms have been recently built in the Infirmary, one on the male and the other on the female side. We do not recommend at present any further change.

Children's Hospital } A new ward has also recently been fitted up in the Hospital for the exclusive accommodation of young children with all the necessary sanitary arrangements.

Utensils We find that all the Hospital patients are supplied with knives, forks, spoons, &c.

The Medical Officers inform us that they are perfectly satisfied with the existing dietary arrangements.

Your Board will remember changes were recently made in the dietary scales for the several classes.

21st Augt. From Ellen Bonnell, contractor for the supply of bread to the Workhouse, informing the Guardians that the compressed state of the atmosphere and the consequent closeness causes the bread to be somewhat sour and dark in the colour, and largely affects yeast.

Trusting the Guardians will not have reason to complain again.

Explanation considered satisfactory and the bread produced was considered to be of fair average quality.

21st Augt. 9 Dr. Lyden, Workhouse Medical officer, applied for and was granted leave of absence for one month, stating that his brother Dr. M. J. Lyden will attend to the discharge of his duties during his absence.
