Gentlemen,

Referring to Mr. Higgins letter of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Instant, stating that you required a written statement of the grounds on which the Tuan Town Commissioners claim exemption from the payment of Rates on the Tolls &c. of the Borough, I have been directed to respectfully request your attention to the 103<sup>rd</sup> Sec of the "Irish Poor Relief Act", (1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> Vic) which states "that no Building, Land, or Hereditament, dedicated to or used for Public purposes, shall be rateable, except where any private profit or use shall be directly derived therefrom, in which case the person deriving such profit or use shall be liable to be rated as an Occupier according to the annual value of such profit or use."

Under that Section the Commissioners claim Exemption, as all the revenue of the Tolls &c are exclusively expended for Public purposes, and that the Commissioners nor any one of them derive no profit or benefit whatsoever from such Tolls.
