Letter from Poor Law Commissioners dated 30th Oct 1853, relative to Law Costs paid to Mr. Conway amounting to £11:9:11.

The Clerk was directed to inform the Commissioners that the above costs were incurred on a cheque issued by the late Board of Guardians amounting to £15 to Mr. Matthew Kearney for services the rateable property of this Union, on which proceedings had been taken and execution issued. in revising the Electoral Division  
of Galway, I find that the  
Townland of Caheruaheen is  
returned as belonging to that Division,  
but Hughes the present collector  
states that Caheruaheen pays  
Rates to the Union of Galway, and  
never paid rates to this Union,  
except on one occasion when  
Ryan the former collector  
enforced payment with a party  
of Military. According to the  
Ordnance Maps this Townland  
belongs to the Parish of Lachagh  
which is in the Union of Galway.
