mix together these wretched objects
without cleanliness, classification, or covering.

In Conclusion I have to state that the
Board will have to take into their serious
consideration the propriety of admitting

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The med. officer reported 11 deaths during the week, that as the Out-door Relief order has arrived suggested that such of the female Paupers as are affected with the Hysterical complaint which appeared sometime ago to be lodged out which would become conducive to their recovery, and calling the attention of the Bd to a charge brought against Mrs. O'Connell the Wardswomen by the fever Nurses and that he dismissed one of them during the week - ad. that the children be lodged out.

The Master reported that hereground 100 yds of calico, spades, shovels &c. - That Honour

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

The Wardenmaid Mrs Connolly asked her to take unstamped Petticoats the property of the House and offer her Whiskey to drink which she refused - and that the supply of Butter was deficient last week and what was bought was bad and refused and therefore to use a larger quantity of sweet Milk (vide Minutes) Sealed over from Poor Law Comd. dated 5 Feb for outdoor Relief to persons under Section 2.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (on Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

1st Letter from the Poor Law Comd. dated 5th Feb 5560, acknowledging the receipt of a representation made to them by Mr Burke Esqr, as to the severe distress in the Tram Division and the workhouse being full, recommending them (the Comd) to issue a sealed order for outdoor relief to persons under Sec 2. which they adopted and issued an order to the effect of remarking on the financial state of the Union funds &c and that they would again address the Guardians (No order).

2nd Letter from same 5 Feb 5560 enclosing Sec 2 order of the Comd for the loan of £800 to be ordered by the Board of Guardians (vide Minutes)

3rd Letter from same 5 Feb 5560 relative to the means of obtaining Labour in return for relief from the Poor Rates &c &c

4th Letter from same 5 Feb 4175 stating that they have the subject of Mr John Hopkins R Officers appointment under consideration & are not yet able to give a final answer on the subject.

Read advice from Mr Kyme Rely Officer for the Headford District tendering his resignation which was accepted by the Board and the Clerk directed to cause advertisements to be issued and considered a next day of meeting.

The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.
