The children are lodged & the general management of the establishment is unsatisfactory -

Both Schoolmasters having been called before the Board were severely reprimanded and cautioned that in the event of any further complaint they would be called on to resign. Letter to Clerk 81073, 5th January requesting the Board of Guardians to reconsider the resolution of 26th ultimo appointing Mich. Brown Superintendent of pauper labourers to the Workhouse, as the Poor Law Commissioners cannot give their sanction to a person who was ^{condemned for the murder of} ~~convicted for the murder of~~ ^{James Claitor's wife} ~~James Claitor's wife~~

Resolved That the Commissioners be requested to sanction the appointment of Mich. Brown as Superintendent of labour in so much as his long services and good character had merited the approbation of the Board and officers under whom he acted and he having undertaken and pledged himself that there should be no repetition of the offence which caused him to resign his former situation

Letter to Clerk 81073. Stating that before the Poor Law Commissioners would give their sanction to the reduction of the relieving officers salaries they would wish the Guardians to consider whether it would not be more advisable to increase the size of the district and reduce the number of Relieving

Relieving Officers. rather than retain a large number of Relieving Officers at reduced salaries, and sanctioning the proposed changes in the salaries of the Hospital Nurse School Master and Assistant School Master, but the Commissioners think that the allowance of rations to the School Master should not be reduced

Resolved That the Poor Law Commissioners be informed that the Board consider it more advisable to retain the number of Relieving Officers at the reduced salaries agreed to on the 6th ultimo except in the cases of Abbey and Moniva which continue as originally arranged in separate districts at a salary of £25 per annum each, also that the salary of the School Master be £25 each instead of £20, with bread & milk rations only.
