The Clerk read letter from the Poor Law Commissioners No 15595, inquiring what the accommodation in the Workhouse was for fever patients and to distinguish the permanent accommodation from that of temporary nature.

The Medical Officer reported that the admissions into hospital have again increased, there having been admitted 32 cases of fever, & 19 cases of dysentery during the last week and it will be seen that the mortality from the latter cause is great.

Out of the number who have died during the week, there have been some, who were admitted since last day of meeting.

The Sheds are nearly ready, and it would be well if a Committee were to visit them and see that they are right. The contractor has exceeded the time allowed further, & ought to be called on to get them up at once but no steps have as yet been taken towards painting or preparing them.

I have to report on the general unhealthy state of the district surrounding this place and also from reports of the districts of the Union far away there have been since Wednesday the 27th May up to Saturday 12th June inclusive 195 applicants for relief in fever 149 in dysentery and 72 in measles which is now so frequent.

Mr Bodkin having arrived Mr Blake vacated the chair, which was taken by Mr Bodkin.
