The Clerk's Report of Vaccination was read—this on the first meeting in every month. Number of successful cases.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

That the House and yards are visibly improved since last Month, calling the attention of the Board to the large quantity of Bedding and Clothing which remains still unopened, the drawing off the water causes the gates to be open which they consider wrong, also reporting that there is no industrial training, and no book or School requisites.

The Medical Officer reports 21 deaths during the Week principally of Dysentery, and that out of 62 admissions during the Week, more than 50 were of Febrile character, reports that the admission of paupers into the House in their own Clothing causes much sickness, and from the number infested with Fleas, was obliged to take up the beds and put patients into them, although not perfectly finished, the Gates not being in and the tarring not completed, reporting that there are a good many articles required and wants them, also that there is a large quantity of Clothing still unopened in the Hall.
