dusty, the females very disorderly and dirty. The Nation complains of having no means to employ the females, the Stone House in the Yard is full of Smoke, which great nuisance, and recommends the Guardians to give something to keep the Women employed = Ordered = That they be given Wool and Flax, to spin, and repair the Flannel Petticoats which are too short for the Women.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows: The Medical Officer reported that there were five deaths during the week, that the Hospital is filling fast, and that fever is decidedly on the increase, both in and out of the House, and that half the new cases admitted into the Hospital have arisen before entering the Work House, that he has acted on the suggestion of the Master, and removed a number of the Infant children to one of the Probationary Yards of the front Building by which means he hopes to prevent an epidemic of Scrofula, which has a tendency to appear — No steps have been taken to procure warmer clothing for the Inmates, and that the Flannel ordered to be procured on last day of Meeting was not procured — The want of a Boundary Wall is much wanted.
