Stating that the Commissioners had on receipt of his Letter of the 29th March last enquiring whether Plough and Horses engaged in the Cultivation of the Land were exempt as in the Case of Rent for Distress from Poor Rate Submitted a Case for the Consideration of the Attorney General who gave an Opinion.

Resolved that we cannot hesitate to comply with Mr. Egan's request and have great pleasure in stating that we consider him eminently qualified to fulfil any contract for building any Workhouse which he may undertake to perform we also feel sure that he will afford that satisfaction to the Commissioners in the execution of his work which he has hitherto never failed to give in any work which he has done for this Board we therefore recommend him strongly to the

Commissioners as a Contractor, also that Mr Egan get a Copy of the Resolution with the Seal of the Union affixed thereon.

The Board having taken into Consideration the increased Numbers in the Workhouse and the probability of the purpose continuing for some time

Resolved that Stephen Rockwell of New Hill and Joseph Kelly Esq^r of New Dorset be requested to Communicate with Mr French of Monaca for the purpose of engaging the Quarters in that Town as an auxiliary Workhouse for the ensuing three Months and that those Gentlemen be authorized to offer a Sum not exceeding £100 for the use of that Building and that their Report be Considered at an adjourned Meeting of this Board to be held on Saturday next the 25th inst.

Read a Report from Mess^{rs} J. Bell & Son N.C. appointed to act as Committee for the purpose of ascertaining the Chargeability of the Workhouse Inmates Stating that having Completed the Revision of the Inmates they had discovered that 94 adults and 10 Children were not on the Books also that there were 97 persons charged on the Books who were not in the House. The Committee also observed that there would be 75 Changes made from one Division to another, and that they had been nothing wanting on their part in Investigating each Case so as to make the Board to charge the several paupers to the S.D. to which they legally belong.

The Board having considered the above report and the list of changes required to be made which

accompanied it, were unanimous in expressing the approbation of the great value of the documents which accompanied it and the ability and diligence displayed in its preparation.

Resolved that the Reports be adopted and that a Sum of £300.0.0. be allowed to each member of the Committee as some compensation for the great trouble they were at, and that same be paid as soon as the Master and other Officers can certify that the alterations & Classification are properly carried out.

Mr Higgins Esq. Member of the Visiting Committee, complained of the Conduct of Mr G. Pauly of Porters of the Galway Road Workhouse, for being absent from that establishment every evening during the past week whilst the Master was also absent on business at the principle N. H. Tavern. The Clerk was directed to inform Pauly that in the event of his ever again being found absent from his duty, he would be forthwith dismissed.

The Collector Act Committee reported that they had investigated the charge & neglect of duty preferred against Mr Joyce of St. Adolph by Mr Roche Esq. of opinion that Mr Joyce could not be charged with the Rate there being no evidence to prove that he could have made a distress.

The Committee recommended

That each Collector be directed to furnish the Guardians of each Division with a list of those parties owing rates, whom the Collector states to be a pauper, so as to enable the Guardians to test the accuracy of the statement.

The Committee further recommend that a list of all persons owing poor Rates to the amt. of £2 or upwards should be posted on the Chapel Doors, after the 1st July next, the lists to contain the number in the Rate Book, name of Townland as well as the amt. due and that in the case of the Electoral Divisions of Clare & Carrumore where the Collectors have been recently appointed the list be published forthwith.

The Committee have to report that in many instances the Collectors have received the amount leaving the rate still uncollected. The Committee recommend that the Collectors should be called on to collect the rate in those instances forthwith.

The Committee have to report that the disqualification for the office of Guardian in consequence of the nonpayment of Rates, should extend to Ex Officio Members as well as Occupiers and that a suggestion that the Law in this respect be altered should emanate from the Board for the consideration of His Majesty's Government.

That Mr. J. J. be directed to hand Mr. Conannon the sum of £10 being the amount of Mr. Blakes Rates received by Mr. J. J. in Dublin also that the scores obtained by the Solicitor for Rates be

be handed to the Collectors.

Resolved that the Recommendation and suggestions of the Collector & Committee be adopted.

The Committee recommend that Judgment should not be entered on the Bonds of the Collectors for Dunmore Cloonhem & Carrumore the amount to be collected being so small and it being understood that they should pay Mr. J. J. £100 each as remuneration for his trouble in perfecting the Bonds and that in future the Bonds be lodged with the Treasurer of the Union.

That Mr. John Pettit John Hall be noticed to attend for the settlement of their Accounts. The Committee are of opinion that most of the rate and arrears due on the Division of Dunmore & Cloonhem and Carrumore are collectable and that no delay should take place in issuing the Warrants for the Collectors.
