Gentlemen

The Board of Guardians of the Duam Union have hitherto abstained from making any appeal to you for pecuniary assistance. but the daily increase of destitution combined with the exhausted state of their funds obliges me to bring their claims under your consideration and at the same time to invite your attention to the manner in which the affairs of the Union have been conducted since the local guardians became entrusted with their management. Referring to the accounts of the Union you will perceive that on our coming into office the Debt amounted to £ 11255-7-10 of which we have since paid £ 6546-11-3. The Current expenses to the 1st June came to £ 9709 and the Balance in the hands of the Treasurer is manifestly inadequate to defray the monthly expenses much less enable us to carry on the affairs of the Union to the period when the striking of a rate might be made available I can refer with satisfaction to the exertions of our Board both as regards providing relief for all deserving objects, and for the large amounts of Rates they have had collected. The Rate made by the Vice Guardians with the amount then due was £ 21697-0-7 of which we have collected £ 16397-3-2 and

You will not fail to observe that of the Balance of £4739.17.5 which now appears due the accumulated arrears of former Rates Composes more than £3000 of that Sum. whilst I feel it unnecessary to remind you of the inability of the Guardians to combat the difficulties that arise from the increasing ^{number} of applicants for relief and the impossibility of collecting the arrears at this season of the year to provide the means necessary for their support I venture to hope that the Duam Union deservedly one of the poorest in the west of Ireland may be enabled to enjoy your favourable consideration of its position which in times of similar distress you were wont to extend to it that the untiring exertions of the Guardians to carry out the Poor Law in its integrity may be rewarded by your recognition of their claims for and during the three succeeding months of paupering and inevitable destitution -

The Report of the Committee appointed to Confer with Mr Wilkinson Poor Law Commission Architect was read as follows -

1st That the shed in the Hoop yard be rebuilt with stone walls and wooden roof felted so that it could be raised at a future period if thought expedient -

The Committee also have to state that should Mr Wilkinson consider Mr Egan's proposal excessive - Mr Egan has consented to accept whatever sum Mr Wilkinson considers the value of the work to be finished =

Read a Communication from M. E. Brown requesting permission of the Board to exhibit the several valuation books at the Board Room prior to their being finally closed - Ordered accordingly =

The Clerk reported that for the last three weeks he was unable to check Mr. Pat Ryan's acct (Collector for Inam) in consequence of the incorrect manner in which his abstract was kept.

Resolved that Mr. Ryan be called on to balance his Rate Receipt abstract and to attend on next board day and explain if possible his neglect of that duty

The Clerk also states that in checking the acct of the Collector for W & District (Mr. Concannon) he observed a receipt that appeared to have been drawn for a different amount than that returned to him the Clerk requests the Board to call on Mr. Concannon for an explanation

Mr. Concannon states that he had filled the Receipt advised to for Mr. Edw. Brown who afterwards had not paid him, that he had then attended it for the Rev. Pat Gibbons who had paid him £2.12 which amount was credited in his collecting warrant & returned as received in his abstract =

W. H. Lucas Esq. Esq. States that in accordance with the desire of the Guardians he has investigated the Charge of Drunkenness preferred against Pat Clancy Porter at Bally Gaddy Hospital when it appeared that the parties who preferred the Charge were actuated by vindictive feelings and were not able to sustain it -

Clancy was called before the Board and Cautions as to his future Conduct -

The Guardians having taken into Consideration the Financial position of this Union, Resolves

That we trust the Commissioners will take into their immediate Consideration the Necessity of affording pecuniary aid to this Union. The Board being quite unable to carry on the Establishment as there is two weeks supply due to the several Contractors besides a large Balance for food alone.
