The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

That some improvement appeared in the general appearance of the Work House, but that the classification of the inmates still requires the most entire vigilance on the part of the respective Officers

The continued delicacy of both the Master & Matron make us reluctant to be too stringent in our demands on their services but it will be the duty of the Board to insist upon more general activity from all employed within the Work House and if such be not speedily exhibited that several alterations will become necessary with respect to the Officers of the Establishment. The Visiting Committee recommend

- 1<sup>st</sup> That a copy of their Report be sent to the Barracks and that each Officer be made acquainted with its suggestions
- 2<sup>nd</sup> That the Master be required to report how far they have been carried out
- 3<sup>rd</sup> That the House be counted at least once a week and a Diary kept showing how each pauper is employed
- 4<sup>th</sup> That the Average Cost of the Maintenance of the House is too high & requires explanation to satisfy

~~The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows.~~  
the Board that it should exceed Galway & other towns =

- 5. That attention be called to the necessity of affording additional facilities for washing the paupers by increasing the number of troughs
- 6. The Ceiling of the Barrack School Room requires immediate repair.
- 7. That the use of wooden Soles to Shoes be discontinued.
- 8. That Orphans shall be preferred when instructing Boys for trades.

The several recommendations of the Committee were adopted.



The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows.

The Medical Officer reported that having been unwell these few days past Mr Greaves had performed the duties of his Office during his absence. He also stated that in consequence of the prevalence of Dysentery, he would suggest that no change should be made in the diet with regard to the substitution of Cocoa for Milk as a deficiency of the latter article can be procured. He also stated that of the deaths which had occurred during the past week 12 had been of Dysentery.

The Master reported he required Flax Seed for sowing on the Workhouse grounds. Order. Also the other require ments. The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect. (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Letter To Clerk In reference to a Resolution on Minutes of the Board. of the 19<sup>th</sup> Inst, relative to the Machine Embroidery & stating that the Comrs. were object to the employment of the inmates in the Workhouse being conducted on the principal proposed. Instead of instruction it is proposed to employ the Children as in a Factory to the manifest injury of persons similarly employed out of the Workhouse.

Letter To Clerk Relative to the substitution of Cocoa for Milk in the diet of certain classes of the Workhouse inmates & requesting to be performed of the object of the resolution and whether the Medical Officer approved of it

Resolved that inasmuch as this Board agreed on the 19<sup>th</sup> March to give Cocoa in lieu of Milk to Classes 1. 2. 3. 4 & 5 and the Doctor having only objected to the use of it as regards the latter number, we hereby direct the use of it for Classes 1. 2. 3 & 4 it being found most difficult to procure Milk of even a moderate quality, and that Cocoa has been substituted for the same Classes in following
