Read Letter from Mr John Harris b.E. Architect for Nuns Building stating that the Contractor had applied to him for a certificate on account of the work done at the Nuns building but as the Contractor had only done about £120. worth of work he could not according to the contract give him a certificate. The letter of Mr Harris having been considered

with an application from the Contractor for a sum of £70 on account the work done a cheque was ordered to be drawn in favor of Mr McNally and to be retained by the Clerk until the Board's Solicitor would be satisfied that the payment of the Cheque would not vitiate the contract.

A Committee consisting of the whole Board with Mr Harris Architect proceeded to the site of Nuns building and examined the work done by the Contractor with the result that a working Committee consisting of Messrs H. Kirwan, S.J. M'Donagh, M.C. Shine, D. Flannery, M.J. Costello; <sup>was appointed</sup> Mr Kirwan to be Chairman and three members to form a quorum.

The Committee having conferred with Mr Harris and reported to the Board the following Minute was adopted by the Board

On Mr Harris's report and with the advice of the Convent Building Committee the Board passes <sup>the</sup> work already done with a few exceptions which Mr Harris will indicate to the Contractor. Mr Harris reports the stone work fairly good. The proposed continuation of new wall into Burial Ground to be left entirely in the hands of the Committee. The present stable for Horse not to be interfered with. The question of altering the size of Nuns garden to be reported upon by Committee to the Board.

On the motion of Mr H. Kirwan the following resolution was carried unanimously.

Resolved - That we the Guardians of Tuam Union strongly condemn the proposed Sale of the Athenry and Ennis Junction Railway to the Midland Great Western Railway Company. We believe it will be most injurious to the people of the West of Ireland and most particularly injurious to the inhabitants of this Union. It will also obstruct and nearly destroy the direct communication between the South and West and on to the North and we ask Parliament to reject the Bill.

Order Copies to be sent to the members of Galway, Mayo, Limerick, Clare and Sligo and to the Committees of Parliament sitting on the Bill

The following resolution proposed by Mr Kirwan and seconded by Mr Costelloe was unanimously adopted -

That the Guardians of the Tuam Union urgently request our Chairman Colonel Nolan M.P. to support the Bill which the Government is bringing in to reorganise the Galway Infirmary and they also ask him to use his influence with the other Irish Members to prevent any opposition being given to it.
