Medical Officer's and Master's Report.

The Medical officer reported that there were not any deaths during the past week and that 53 persons remained under treatment.

The Medical officer also reported that the tea for the inmates is complained of as being badly tasted owing to the fact that it is made in the same boiler as the Cocoa and suggests that a separate boiler or Urn for tea-making be procured. The tea, moreover, as it reaches the patients in the Infirmary is often quite cold, from the fact that it is conveyed in tubs to the Infirmary from the kitchen. He thinks covered one-tin pints ought be made and that each persons allowance of tea be sent to him covered and warm.
