From the Local Government Board acknowledging receipt of replies to their queries respecting the appointment of Mr Judge to the Office of Relieving Officer in the Union and calling attention to the reply to query 13 to the effect that Mr William Judge's "residence is central and not connected with any inn or shop for retail of spirituous liquors &c" and pointing out that they were informed that Mr Judge's father sells Tobacco.

Also requesting an explanation from the Clerk of the Union and Mr Judge as to the misleading statement inserted in the query.

Order The Board have made the inquiry desired. The facts are Mr Judge Senior sells Tobacco and provisions. Mr Judge Junr who is the Relieving Officer does not reside in the house in which the Tobacco is sold and has no connection with any retail trade of any kind.
