C. dated the 9<sup>th</sup> instant in reply to the Guardians Minute of the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant, stating that the defects in the six pipes showed themselves when the full pressure of the Water was first put on them and probably were caused by some injury received in carriage from Glasgow to Tuam. all

all the pipes in question were tested and only the six above referred to were found defective out of over two thousand pipes, this is not a large percentage: these defects could not be discovered until the joints had been made watertight and the full pressure of water turned on.

It is not usual for cast-iron pipes, which have successfully stood the full water pressure when laid in place to be subsequently, although this sometimes happens. No qualified Engineer would give the Board any guarantee on the subject, I certainly do not. But the Board may rest assured that I certify no work to be right until I have quite satisfied myself that it is so.
