The Medical Officer reported that there were not any deaths during the past week and that 59 persons remained under treatment.

The Medical Officer also drew the Guardians attention to the fact that in the unceiled female wards last night the temperature reached to 2° F below freezing point.

That painting of the doors and woodwork generally of Infirmary was badly required.

Orders Painting and ceiling of wards deferred the present frosty weather being unsuitable for such work.

The Master reported for the information of the Local Government Board that on Sunday evening the 31st Ultimo he saw the deceased Walter Long carrying Turf from the Yard to the body of the House, he was then apparently in good health. At about 5.30 he was called to the Day room by a pauper inmate named Cotten. He at once repaired to the place and found the said Walter Long lying on the floor in an unconscious state. The priest

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

and doctor were immediately sent for, both of whom attended soon after. He saw the man often during the night and on Monday morning before 9 O'Clock Long never recovered consciousness till he died.

Duiget M'Kien was on the same morning in good health at 9 O'Clock she got up to the fire and took some tea. Shortly after she became suddenly weak, and was removed to bed by the Wardswoman. She expired after 15 minutes illness and before the priest and doctor could attend. He informed the D. J. P. J. C. of the occurrences and inquests were held in both cases—Verdict in 1st case—"death from natural causes to wit apoplexy." = 2nd case—"death from natural causes to wit stoppage of the hearts action"

The Master also reported that the closets at the male side of the House were thrown down by the contractor Mr. McHally and that at present there was no place for the men to repair to. That he submitted set of Harness for inspection: and that the Matrons room required to be repaired.

That the analysis shall specify what quantity, if any, per imperial gallon each sample contains of albuminoid ammonia, and also what quantity, if any, per imperial gallon each sample contains of Saline Ammonia. That the samples be marked for identification and that the analysis shall also for identification refer to those. That as soon as received a true copy of the analysis of both samples shall be either forwarded ^{by registered letter} or personally delivered to every member of this Board. That unless and until this be done the Board cannot and will not entertain any proposal for taking a supply of Water from the Lism Waterworks. That when a true copy of the analysis of both samples of water shall have been either delivered or forwarded as aforesaid to every member of this Board, and not sooner, fourteen days notice at the least shall be given or forwarded to every Guardian of this Union that the question of taking a supply of water from the Lism Waterworks shall be considered, and that said fourteen days shall be computed not from the day Notice shall have been given to the Chairman at this Board but that said fourteen days shall be computed from the day the last copy of said notice shall
