over forty years, they appear now quite useless - Together with all two perches of a dead wall in the street along which a filthy and sham nuisance is being committed day and night. I think it right to inform you of the matter now before the summer sets in, the place being a very poor and populous district, where Contagion would be likely to take hold if not prevented by Sanitary interference.

Mr John Hanly Sanitary Sub Officer reported that he visited the townlands near Ryehill where the ratepayers and people that locality wrote to the Board stating they require pure water. He finds they do require water as there is no well or Spring nearer than the pump at Monivea and the water at the bridge of Killaclougher a distance of one and two miles respectively.

There are about thirty families in the locality and a large School within the radius and that the townlands requiring water are as follows: - Bullaun, Knockauncarragh, Garrynard and Bakerlisakell part in Monivea and Ryehill Electoral Divisions in Tuam Union. And recommending that a pump be built near Fox's house at Knockauncarragh it being the lowest ground in the district and most central for all the townlands that require the water.

Order - Notice to be served on each Guardian that the area of charge would be the following townlands viz: - Bullaun, Knockauncarragh, Garrynard and Bakerlisakell. The Executive Sanitary officer to procure a Specification of the works from a competent man and submit same to the Board.

The Medical officer reported that there was one death during the past week and that 53 persons remained under treatment.

Read Letter from the Privy Council Veterinary Department N^o 638192 dated 24th February 1892 having reference to the outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease in Great Britain and containing instructions for the information of Local Authorities in view of its possible introduction into Ireland.

Application having been made by ratepayers named James Lardner, John Lynskey and Thomas Lardner in the Electoral Division of Belclare to have their names placed on the ratebook instead of those whom they represent. It was proposed by Mr. Golding, Seconded by Mr. Flannery and adopted.

That a fresh sample of water for analysis be taken from source N^o 2, or Infirmary pump in the Workhouse, and that said sample be taken from the delivery pipe and not from the tank; and that a sample of water be also taken for analysis from the fountain nearest to the Workhouse supplied from the Tuam Waterworks, and that both samples be taken and forwarded for analysis on the same day in the presence and under the superintendence of such Guardians as may be nominated for such purpose by the Board. That the analysis shall specify what quantity, if any, per imperial gallon each sample contains of

of albuminoid ammonia, and also what quantity, if any, per imperial gallon each sample contains of saline ammonia.

That the samples be marked for identification, and that the analysis shall also for identification, refer to those marks.

That as soon as received a true copy of the analysis of both samples shall either be personally delivered or forwarded by registered letter to every member of this Board. That unless, and until, this be done, the board cannot and will not entertain any proposal for taking a supply of water from the Tuam Waterworks.
