The Clerk reported that the Contracts for supplying the out door relief depots in the 2^d, divisions of the Union with Indian meal will expire on 25th inst.

Ordered. That advertisements be opened inviting proposals for same for 1, 2, or 3 mos from 25 inst. Tenders to be Considered on 21st inst.

The Vice Guardians having Considered four proposals for supplying the out door relief depots with bread. Resolved that T. Murray's proposal to supply Innam Division at 5^{1/2}p per 4lb loaf and Clare Island, Innam, Cummer, Annadown Headford, Drompatrick and Killanion Edens at 4^{1/2} the 4lb loaf. Also that Martin McDowell's proposal to supply Donmore Edens with bread at 3^{1/2}p per 4lb loaf and Bloombene Lisgeavey, Monivea, Killercine and Abby at 4^{1/2} the 4lb loaf up to the 1st of May next be accepted.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

That a new Metal Wheel be procured for the mill also that the Matrons and porters rooms be plastered.

In Consequence of the ragged and filthy state of the Clothing belonging to the paupers admitted from time to time into the house,

Resolved that the master be allowed to deduct from his stock of Clothing the following worn out articles belonging to the Union which were given in view of those rags destroyed in order to prevent infection viz. 61 Mens Suits, 74 Womens Suits, 70 boys Suits, and 82 girls and infants Suits.

Ordered that the Clerk inform the Town Comm^rs that as the duty of carrying out the intentions of the above acts rests with them the Vice Gdns cannot interfere in the matter.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:—)

Letter to Vice Gdns 13203 relative to the additional accommodation obtained by taking two additional houses in the town of Inland, also sanctioning the rate of remuneration allowed to the Miller, Master Shoe maker and Master Baker and amount of salary proposed to be granted to Hubert Dulap.

Ord^r that the P. L. Comm^r be informed that the two houses taken as additional houses in Inland will give increased accommodation for 500.

Letter to Clerk 13083. 3^r March acknowledging receipt of replies to Queries respecting the appointment of Peter Greavey as R Off^r in the Inland Union and sanctioning his appointment.

Circular to Clerk 13141. 28th Feb. requesting a statement of the no. of persons whose names appear on the list of Rate payers in this Union who have received relief up to the present time without surrendering their farms.

Circular to Clerk 179 " 1st Mar. 28th Feb. requesting a weekly statement of the no. of able bodied males who received out door relief in this Union with their families during year ended 29th Sep 48 and the cost of such relief.

Do. No. 180 requesting the usual monthly return of liabilities.

Do 186. requesting the usual monthly return of rate. Circular 13139. 24th Feb. Calling for a return of all notices served upon R Officers under 11 and 12 & 13 Cap 47. Return to be made upto the 19th February 1849.
