The Poor Law Commissioners requested to call Mr. Wilkinson's attention to the plan, and Specifications forwarded to him of the Savings, and which the Poor Law Commissioners in their letter of 11th January No. 1235 stated had been done, since which time the Poor Guardians have not heard from Mr. Wilkinson, a Complaint made by Mr. Duffey a Paragon against James Mannion, the Superintendent of Labouring in the Work House for striking him with a Stick, having been investigated, the charge was found to be unfounded, but it appearing that Mannion had been given him a Push, which caused him to fall and put his Eye, Mannion was called and reprimanded and cautioned against using any violence in the discharge of his duty.
